Bruce joined the staff as Head of Department of Social Science in July 1984. Appointed Deputy Principal in December 1997, he has now completed over 17 years as Deputy Principal and is the school's longest serving Deputy Principal.

Based on research from his own classroom and in the wider College environment, Bruce has co-authored a number of articles that have been published in a range of educational publications. He also authored the first publication of *Life Enlightened by Learning* in 2005.



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The foreword to 'Life Enlightened by Learning – the first 40 years' states that the 50-year reunion would take place at Easter 2015. A reconsideration of that date has seen the event move forward to be as close as possible to the beginning of the year – Waitangi weekend, 6/7 February – the week that the college opened in 1965. The foreword to the 2005 publication also stated that a further publication would follow in 2015. This is it – Life Enlightened by Learning – Volume II covering the decade 2005-2014. It is hoped that Volume III will be published when the life of the college reaches another milestone.

The Archive Room is established and an archivist employed throughout the past decade. The Principal's annual reports are now substantial documents held electronically and the college's annual publication of TREK (school magazine) has continued. Each passing decade has increased the amount of evidence available to the historian and digital photography has ensured a multitude of photographs.

Land, buildings, resources, finance and staffing levels are all important and the college is dependent upon careful management of them to ensure that its central function of providing the widest range of learning opportunities can continue to the best possible standard.

The past decade has seen an ever increasing diversity of staff and student populations but it has also had the good fortune to continue with a dedicated core of staff whose selfless service has maintained the traditions of quality academic, cultural and sporting activities.

Society has continued to change and the pace of that change – particularly in relation to technology – has moved at an ever faster pace, often increasing the gap between adult and student and placing an ever growing pressure on school management. Teachers are working harder to master new methodologies of teaching but it is more important than ever that parents are central to the life of young people. Sadly that is not always the case.

The college is the single institution in Otumoetai and surrounding suburbs with which most residents have had some association. It may be as a volunteer, as a grandparent, as a parent considering where to send their son or daughter to school, as a parent or as a student. All have formed perceptions – favourable or otherwise – which become memories and over time the 'real' lived experience of the college. These are the stories that will be told and retold at the 50th reunion and at future reunions.

At the end of 2004 when Volume I of 'Learning Enlightened by Life' was published to commemorate the fortieth anniversary of the college, Dave Randell was Principal, Bruce Farthing and Ricky Feutz were Deputy Principals, and all three men remain in the same position at the end of 2014. All three who have collectively had the major hand in shaping the college's direction, have been awarded 10 week sabbaticals – Dave Randell in 2007 & 2014, Ricky Feutz in 2009 and Bruce Farthing in 2013. In Dave's absence, both Bruce and Ricky accepted the role of Acting Principal.

Appointed to a Principal's position for 2008, Deputy Principal Mihi Moloney resigned and was replaced in term 2, 2008 by Pip Woodward. Deputy Principal Robyn Pettigrew resigned in mid 2010 to teach in South Korea and was replaced in term 3, 2010 by Jude Brown who, after over 25 years of teaching in Southland, chose to come north.

In 2014 there were no members remaining of the 2004 Board. In 2004 Nikki Burley was Board Chair and as a lawyer she brought an acute and balanced mind to the position. Nikki, who was the mother of three former students (two of whom were Head Boys), was very interested in education and unlike some of her predecessors, had an accurate understanding of the very real difference between management and governance. In 2008 Nikki passed the Chairmanship to Andy Ralph (also the father of a previous Head Boy), who was by profession the head of the Planning Division of the Tauranga City Council. A clearly focused strategist, Andy re-arranged the committee structure of the Board so that there were only two committees – Operations and Strategic – and further reduced the number of Board policies by ensuring that anything of a procedural nature was included in management procedures. In 2011 Sharon Hitchcock replaced Andy Ralph as Chair. Sharon, a previous chair of the PTA, was passionate about her local community and the local secondary school attended by her three children, and was the person who initiated the first International Food Festival in March 2005. Sharon accepted and did not alter the structure left behind by Andy and in 2013 was replaced as Chair by John Paine, the first past student of the school to hold the position of Board Chair.

A staff representative, a Maori representative (throughout the decade – Ray Nelson) and an annually elected student representative, joined a variety of local parents throughout the decade to make up a full Board of Trustees. The college has never faced any difficulty having a range of suitably qualified parents to stand for Board elections and has been well served by their energy and ability once elected. Some have been elected unaware of the complexities of a large modern secondary school and 'once trained', came to appreciate that their previously held opinions of what might be good ideas were really not ever going to happen.

The decade began and ended with good Board/ Management relations which were maintained throughout the whole period. As Principal, Dave Randell supplied his Boards with more than adequate information about the running of the college and in turn, the Board agreed to establish policies in keeping with the wishes of management. Strategic Plans have grown in significance over the life of the college. Following on from community consultation, three year strategic plans were established in 2003 and 2007 and then in 2012 a five year strategic plan was agreed. The plans are 'owned' by the Board of Trustees but in reality are a partnership document worked on together by both senior staff and trustee representatives. The 2003 and 2007 plans were essentially driven by Bruce Farthing and were focused on 'Learning' being of paramount importance in the school's operation. He stood aside in 2011 and Pip Woodward (assisted by Jude Brown), after leading a community consultation, drove through a Strategic Plan more focused on the development of the 'whole' student, and in line with all the work and research Pip had completed when helping to develop the PE and Health Curriculum. A very comprehensive document, it has become the cornerstone of professional development and learning, and the management of students based on the principles of restorative justice. Core to the strategic plan is raising achievement of poorly performing students, particularly Maori. On his appointment in 1984, Principal Peter Malcolm concluded that although academically able students were achieving extremely well the less academically able students were performing poorly. Thirty years later the situation in 2014 is little different and the issue, despite all strategic direction planning, has remained unresolved. There is now a greater urgency and the pressure is coming from the Ministry of Education. For plans to be effective they must result in change.

Central to the 2012 Mission and Vision are the five defined values of:

Belonging and Connecting

High Expectations

Building Strong Positive Relationships

Life long, life wide learning

Helping our community

and together they shape the Strategic Plan and the Behaviour for Learning Framework which defines the implementation of the mission and vision. The Framework drives the daily management of students both through individual Faculty systems and the Deans'/ Guidance network. It is important for consistency that all staff are guided in their practice by a common understanding, and much effort has gone into ensuring this outcome.

From the five-year Strategic Plan are derived school-wide annual goals and in turn annual Faculty/Department goals, which are a further tailored refinement of the goal to a specific end point. Such a process ensures that what is agreed to by the Board becomes a functioning reality on the ground. Throughout the decade the Ministry of Education has required that an Analysis of Variance be submitted by the end of March of each year detailing how well the college performed to the previous year's annual goal(s).

The annual completion of this document has demanded of management the gathering and analysis of evidence – in the form of data – attendance data, academic achievement data, NCEA data, behavioural data and survey (survey-monkey) data. The data, now built up

over years, allows for comparison but management has always been very firmly of the view that one cohort can be analysed and compared year by year only unto its own, and not with another. This firmly held view caused the management to invest in a computer programmer to build a program to analyse results against previously collected learning data held on each individual student, and to highlight whether or not a student is 'on track' during an academic year based on previous ability scoring. The increasing complexity and availability of data bases has meant increasing efficiency.

Parents/caregivers can be texted of an unexplained student absence, subject selection is, now in 2014, completed online, and parents/caregivers can book online for parent/teacher report afternoons. Prior to 2005 the college had moved from the MUSAC software management system to Integris (the Ministry of Education, which left the choice to schools from the competitive open market and then rated the various systems and brought Integris out in front), but the poor take up of Integris by other schools saw the Head Office move to Perth and it became functionally impractical to continue, and the college moved to the locally designed KAMAR. The on-going development of Information Communication Techonolgy (ICT) occupied many hours of the ICT committee, chaired by Ricky Feutz. Constant cost constraints and rapid technological development caused the staff to view the college as always in constant catch-up mode. The best possible was achieved within the constraints.

Decade long pressures on the management of school finances has meant the need for careful stewardship, constant juggling and the need to raise ever more to cope with demand. Three Financial Managers had control throughout the 10 year period. Sue Weal reigned until term three, 2007 and then the position went to her assistant, Accounts Clerk Jacqui Chapman (Jacqui had previously been the database manager). Maggie Stewart was then appointed Accounts Clerk. A decision to return to live in England saw Jacqui resign in 2011 and after interviews the decision made to give the job to Susan Quinn who remains, assisted by accountants clerk Maggie Stewart. A qualified Accountant, Susan Quinn, like her predecessor, took charge of administering the office and her innovative monthly report to the Board of Trustees Operations sub-committee was a welcome straight forward explanation of the monthly accounts. Heads of Departments came to respect Susan's vigilant approach to their financial situation.

The need to generate additional funding saw the careful management of, and applications to, various Trusts. Carefully policed by Dave Randell as to who could apply for what, the application process was managed through the Sports Office.

International Students had become a significant feature of the college with 75 students enrolled in 2004 from a

variety of countries - amongst others from Germany, Hong Kong, Thailand, Brazil – with Roy Ballantyne as Director of International Students. The decade ends with 73 students enrolled, still from a variety of countries and Roy Ballantyne still as Director of International Students. Ably supported by an office staff of three – Joan Troy has been constant in her employment – management and numbers have remained consistent. This has been due to aggressive marketing – spear-headed by Dave Randell and Roy Ballantyne - because a majority of New Zealand schools saw a marked decline in numbers over the decade. An ever more global world of education saw a marked increase in student, staff and Principal overseas travel. Initial Board Chair approval saw the college pay for both Dave Randell and his wife to travel together, however increasing pressure saw this continue only when his wife Jude was actively working, chaperoning students or assisting with marketing. When she was accompanying Dave to International Principals' Conferences / International Educational Law Association Conferences, Jude paid her own way. Dave readily agreed to this arrangement.

The need for continuous improvement saw a number of staff work to improve their qualification. Sandy Boubee (PE & Health), Jason Ellwood (HOF Mathematics), Jean Grattan (HOF Science) and Pip Woodward (Deputy Principal) all completed or are working towards their Masterate Degrees. The awarding of a Ministry of Education Study Grant entitling the equivalent of one day a week off school, has helped facilitate this study.

Keeping abreast of educational innovation has seen travel overseas – Ricky Feutz to Australia for 'Boys Education'; Jude Brown to Australia to look at Flexible Learning Environments; Pip Woodward to present in San Francisco and Bruce Farthing to undertake a detailed review of History pedagogy in England and North America.

Dave Randell has regularly attended International Principals' Conferences in South Africa, New Zealand, Canada and in 2015 Scandinavia, and used his sabbaticals to bring back new ideas. Both management and staff have regularly attended relevant New Zealand conferences judged to be of significance.

The increasing politicisation of education has brought visits by the Minister of Education and both Prime Ministers – Helen Clark and John Key – and these coupled with the college's regular involvement in PISA (International testing regime which ranks nations) and three ERO visits, have all subtly added pressure to the management/staff and therefore the Board, through endless meetings to work through initiatives and develop strategies. It has been important to keep these in-line with the college's strategic plan.

Management has added significantly to the co-ordination of education beyond the school gates, across the city of

Tauranga and the Western Bay Of Plenty. Jude Brown has managed Alternative Education. Ricky Feutz has managed the college's off site Outdoor Education Centre – Oteora, Bruce Farthing has chaired the WBOP Secondary / Tertiary Committee and Pip Woodward currently represents the BOP on the National Secondary School DP/AP Association. Dave Randell has chaired the local Secondary School Principals' Association for many years. All this work has helped to grow the reputation of the college and bring satisfaction to individual careers.

Success of various past students has helped increase the college's reputation. Amongst other noted successes are the announcement of Richard Higgins as the NZ 2011 Rhodes Scholar, Emma Dwight gaining an entrance Scholarship to Harvard University in 2013,

Jonathan Cullen gaining a Cambridge University PhD in Engineering and then being appointed to the Staff, Rhys Macowns, PhD Scholarship to the University of London; Reuben Lee's PhD from the University of Delf and his subsequent appointment to the executive team of Phillips International, and Sonja Farthing's Medical School Awards. All this proves that the college has provided and continues to offer a world class education.

In term 3 2014, Dave Randell returned from his sabbatical re-energised to co-ordinate his management team and lead the college forward into the next 50 years. He can justifiably be proud of his achievements (in April 2013 the staff celebrated his completing 25 years as Principal of three schools) but he remains very aware of the challenges ahead.

- Growing Strong Relationships the importance of productive and trusting learning relationships are seen as paramount in strengthening learner engagement, presence and achievement.
- Life long, life wide learning all learners have the opportunity to develop skills, knowledge and attributes that will equip them to be learners for life and successfully contribute and successfully respond to a changing global world.
- Promoting high expectations- create a climate and culture where there is shared responsibility to articulate and model high achievable expectations for all learners.
- Serving our community commitment to contributing to the community through a range of initiatives both student and staff led. These initiatives strengthen partnerships, utilise the diverse expertise available, build a strong sense of altruism and are responsive to unique needs of the wider community.

Guiding Principles of this plan

- 1. The "Otumoetai Way": this reflects the school's vision and values and has been co-constructed by all members of the school community through a consultation process. It is envisaged that this will be further developed and launched by students school-wide and will articulate a shared 'mantra' that will guide both students and staff to build a safe and supportive learning culture encouraging excellence for all learners in all areas of school life.
- 2. All school wide policies and procedures are responsive and reinforce the partnerships and collective responsibility of the wider school community.
- 3. To use qualitative and quantitative data, education research, skill and experience of staff to inform all decisions impacting on learning and school operations. Quality teaching and learning is based on informed and sound pedagogical practice and meaningful learning is paramount.
- 4. Apply the equity in learning principle promoting learning opportunities for all.
- 5. School wide policies and procedures relevant to the learners are based on restorative practices and the building of learner resilience.
- 6. The Treaty of Waitangi principle's: Participation, Protection and Partnership are used to guide and support all decision making that impacts on the achievement of our Maori students.
- 7. The Strategic Plan aligns to the Charter, Financial Management and 5 Year Property Plan.
- 8. Annual planning and reporting of specific targets and achievement.
 - The Senior Leadership Team will prepare an annual plan that defines specific and measurable targets for the year. Each learning area will then develop their own annual plan that will reflect the action required to achieve these targets. Annually reports will be presented to the Board and wider school community on key information on performance, achievement and behaviour at year level, departmental and school wide.
- 9. A commitment to resourcing according to proven need, quality employment, and continuous improvement of all aspects of school plant, equipment, buildings, grounds and specialist facilities.
- 10. Board and management will work together to ensure quality employment of the best available staff, supported by responsive professional learning opportunities and a robust Performance Management framework.

Otumoetai College has continued to be fortunate in acquiring quality staff – the reasons remain the same as during the first forty years – the location in one of the most attractive parts of New Zealand and a well-earned reputation.

As the decade closes, four current staff have completed over 25 years' service, seven current staff have completed 30 years' service and seven past staff completed 30 years' service. Current staff who have completed over 25 years of service are; Colin Mossong, Chris Pearson, Francis Dunham, Larry Dixon, Doreen Swetman and Barry Dick, and current staff who have completed 30 years (but under 40) of service are Roy Ballantyne, lain McGregor,

Paul Furneaux, Bruce Farthing, Alan Galletly, Keith Macown, Mike Livingston and Carolyn Harrowfield.

The commitment they have both individually and collectively made, and continue to make, amounts to an enormous contribution. In most cases their children have been educated at the school and their partners heavily involved across the areas of academica, sport and culture. Thirty years of service is now recognised by dated photos of those who met the criterion, being framed for the interior wall of the college administration block. Student numbers remained remarkably consistent across the decade and staffing numbers therefore equally consistent. Because of the size of staff, Faculty resource rooms came to increasingly ensure staff loyalty first

to their Faculty. Some Faculties were further divided into Departments. Faculty leaders actively discouraged across-Faculty teaching and increasingly not only was lunch eaten in Faculty Resource Rooms but also morning tea. The staffroom was often near empty at lunchtime. Staff relations within Faculties were in the main very strong and a 'collective' faculty view to issues was clearly apparent. This is what the staff came to know and were comfortable with, yet it was frustrating at times to management wanting to initiate cross-curricular initiatives as these were sometimes met with "can we please meet/action within our Faculty".

Persistence by management saw an across-faculty approach to Professional Learning / Development in latter years. Despite this strong traditional Faculties / Departments system of operation, there was within them, innovative pedagogy (teaching methodology). Across such a large staff there was observable difference in pedagogy from traditional transmission through to pupil-centred learning approaches, but as the decade continued the latter became increasingly evident. Heads of Faculty / Department had the responsibility of ensuring learning methodologies and assessment regimes – accountable through Deputy Principals to the Principal and the Principal's nominee (**Bruce Farthing**) in relation to NZQA issues. The appointment of new

staff saw the HOF/HOD working with the relevant Deputy Principal. Faculties were divided between Deputy Principals for liaison to advise the Principal of, amongst other matters, who should be offered a position in their department.

A characteristic of the decade has been the retirement of long serving staff and the handing over to a younger generation. In 2012 Graham Leigh retired, having handed over HOD of the Guidance Department in 2005 to **Grant Nissen**, and then remaining part-time. **Henry Dixon** retired as HOF Mathematics Department in 2012 and was replaced by his deputy, the much younger Jason Ellwood. Hiriwa Curnow retired in 2013 after 33 years and Maori language teaching fell to the much younger **Debbie Rahurahu** who was appointed HOD of Maori at the end of 2014. Alistair Blair also retired after 29 years of teaching. **Sheena Miller** was appointed Deputy Principal of Te Puke High School in 2009 and the Head of English position that she left behind was filled by **Dave Shefferd. Colin Mossong** stood aside as HOD Visual Arts in 2013 and the position was filled by his deputy Sarah-Jane Smith. Jean Grattan headed Science, Larry Dixon headed Social Science, **Kay Farthing** headed Pathways/Careers/Gate-way, Vicky Jeffares headed Music, Mandy Rowe headed

Drama and Performing Arts, and Kevin Meyer headed Technologies throughout the decade. The Business Faculty, headed by **Alan Galletly**, introduced the once-aterm 'market day' and underlined the importance of new learning opportunities being added to the curriculum as societal norms continue to shift. The ever increasing professional demands placed on teachers by NCEA assessment, moderation, performance management, personal inquiries amongst others, have resulted in a lower uptake of staff involvement in extra-curricular activities. 2014 saw parental involvement in directing and helping backstage operations to stage the college show, and fewer staff involved on a regular basis with sport. The percentage of students involved in extracurricular activities remains high, as does parental involvement.

Unfortunately, and sadly, there have been teachers who have died when members of the staff or when recently retired.



Helen Woods, who joined the staff in 2000 and rose to become the Assistant Head of English, sadly was diagnosed with cancer at the end of 2004 and bravely continued to teach and battle the condition until her death on Boxing Day, 2010. Her funeral service was held in the Performing Arts Centre on 29 December 2010 where Bruce Farthing, who had helped tutor her to be a teacher, delivered a eulogy on behalf of the staff. Helen's son, Petar, was educated at the college from 2003-2007.







A school is not the land or buildings, it is he tāngata, he tāngata, he tāngata – the people, the people, the people. Yet there cannot be a school without land and the buildings do remain important, but the construction and maintenance of them takes up hours and hours of management time.

Volume One of 'Life Enlightened by Learning' page 32, reads, "The school has been redeveloped to a standard which now makes it the envy of almost every secondary school in the country." (2001/2002)

Starting in early 1999 the great majority of the school was rebuilt, meaning many hours of input by management and frustration for the teaching staff. The rebuild was essentially complete for the start of the 2002 school year. Very fortuitously, Dave Randell took over control as Principal in October 2000 and although not involved in the initial design work, he was there to see the project through to its final completion. Again from page 32 of Volume One, "Dave Randell was able 'to get blood from a stone' when apparently the amount agreed upon for new Astroturf went from zero dollars to \$50,000 to \$100,000 to \$200,000 within minutes."

Dave has a particular interest in plant and can only be described as a brilliant project manager. Guiding his property team he has single-handedly ensured the maintenance of the plant to be amongst the best in New Zealand, and proven himself an innovator to overcome problems, e.g., the 2007 placing of the Business Faculty Resource Room in the internal stair lobby of G Block and adding an external stairway, saved a whole classroom. The major problem that came to exist by 2012 – leaking buildings – was not of his making but nevertheless left to him to work through.

Every year Dave ensured the enhancement of the teaching environments and the school grounds. In 2005 a large and small grandstand (moved from the old Baypark) were moved to sit alongside Windsor Road, to make for comfortable seating when watching sport. They were to become known as the 'Randell' stand and the 'Henderson' stand. The old changing room complex, opposite the canteen, was converted to a staff / referee changing room and a weatherproof outside cover was erected in front of the canteen.

In 2006 a two-storey Health & PE classroom block, including two full classrooms and a kitchen, was added overlooking the fields. The area can be divided by soundproof doors into three parts. Underneath is an extensive area for storage of sports gear. Pre-fab number 2 was converted into another computer room and the over-generous entrance ways into D Block (English) and

F Block (Mathematics) were converted into additional office space.

In 2007 another additional computer room was added to B Block for Graphic Art and there was a focus on additional car parks – extending the existing one alongside the Windsor Road entrance to the Action Centre and adding more between J1 and K Block. The old tennis pavilion against the north wall of the original gym facing the Astroturf, was renovated into changing rooms. On the other side of the Astroturf a memorial garden was constructed as a place of remembrance for those students who have died in the last decade while enrolled as students of our school. Sadly 7 past students are remembered: Jordan Crokett 13/10/2006, Sarah McLean 16/12/2006, Daisy Fernandez 1/01/2008, Rose O'Brien 26/12/2008, Kieran Judd 17/02/2009, Anthony Hill 4/03/2009, Samantha Mouat 3/04/2010.



Memorial Garden

The major project of 2006-2007 was the long awaited renovation of 'A' Block. The decision had been made in 1998 to finance the teaching and learning spaces first and leave the Administration 'A' Block to last. The money ran out and the Admin 'A' Block was never touched. Dave Randell decided it could wait no longer, the final decision coming after the May 2005 flooding of Tauranga, when a civil emergency was declared and Ricky Feutz's office became an internal waterfall. The old office and senior management offices, along with the Dean's Room and A1 Music classroom, were all demolished and replaced after 15 months of construction. The school gained a new formal entrance and students could access the Deputy Principal Offices from the revamped courtyard. A new room for the Deans included space for the Senior Administrators and new separate offices for the Attendance Officer and Database Manager. The old staff room was converted to the now A1 Music Room and a new staffroom built upstairs (enhanced by Darryn

Marshall's beautiful carving of the Western Bay on the background of stainless steel). Twice the size of the old staffroom, it rested over 10 new practice music rooms. A new Drama Room was constructed on the Windsor Road side of the Performing Arts Centre with additional storage space and a new purpose-built Uniform Shop. Using the knowledge and skill of Iain McGregor, the old assembly hall was converted into a Performing Arts

Centre – with the stage lower and extended and new wings added – creating a stage the equal of Baycourt. When new terraced seating and new lighting was installed, this major revamp created an auditorium worthy of praise.

2008 also saw an addition al area built for motor mechanics in C Block to house the growing popularity of the automotive course.

The whole 'A' Block redevelopment cost over \$3 million and was finally completed in 2008 with the installation of a new sound system, widening of the doors, and a ticket office – since disbanded and used as additional storage space by the main office.

In September 2009 the college signed a new 5 year agreement with the Ministry of Education which guaranteed finance for maintenance and upgrades and the engineering firm BECA completed a 10 year landscaping programme to enhance the school grounds. The 5 Year Plan was to be of value but the 10 year landscaping plan was to prove a waste of time. A quieter year on the building front, new bus shelters were built as was a new student BBQ area.

The 2010 developments saw construction begin on a new Special Needs Unit (the previous building was demolished) an additional office and classroom (K10) added for the Pathways/Careers Department inclusion of the ever growing Gateway Programme and a purpose built ICT Technician Room. J3 classroom was refurbished as a Wharekai and plans drawn up for a

revamp of the Art Block that had not been part of the 10 year earlier remodelling of the college.

In 2011 the \$900,000 Special Needs complex was opened by Simon Bridges and work got underway on the new Art Block. Both the PE staff and the Mathematics Department saw their staff faculty rooms modified and in the case of PE enlarged as well.

The internal area of the Action Centre was remodelled, creating a corridor from the Windsor Road entrance, and significantly better storage. The outside look of the school was changed when money was made available to implement part of the landscaping plan and a new garden and seating areas were established between F and G Blocks. Some minor alterations were made to the Deans' Room (partitions and a new meeting room), the library, and A3 Drama Room had a new polished floor installed for the teaching of Dance. In 2012 the Art Department was very grateful to move into the new B Block, a block into which Colin Mossong and his team had had a major input. However, the two big upstairs rooms remained on hold

due to lack of finance. The Performing Arts Centre was carpeted and new seating installed. The original school tennis pavilion, by now a set of changing rooms, was changed again - this time into a Sports office 'shop' and home to all school (and sporting) uniforms. No one was more pleased than Debbie McBride who administered uniform distribution as she now had room to move. All shade cloth across the school was replaced, planning got underway for a new ablutions block for the marae – Okohanga – complex, and available 'workday' money was spent on further gardens and seating in the main quad.

The marae ablutions block was completed in 2013 and discussions began in relation to all the on-site 'leaky' buildings that followed from the 1999-2002 school upgrade. Discussions continued all year with plans constantly changing and real frustration for Dave Randell and Deputy Principal Jude Brown who Dave placed on the building committee. The year ended with only one action – five old prefabs were placed on the edge of the field for classes to be temporarily rehoused, causing the 'Henderson stand' to be moved alongside the Randell stand on Windsor Road.

2014 saw the discussions on remodelling the school continue but at least some action got underway. The Tech classes all used the reconditioned prefabs as the Block was re-roofed and re-clad. It is expected that this will be completed by the end of January 2015, just in time for the 50th reunion. A small change, but making a significant difference, was the remodelling of the Library to bring the former New Zealand room and Archives room (now far too small) into the main library. The office, originally built for and used by Continuing Education, was no longer required for that purpose after the government withdrew funding for the programme and it was converted into the school Archives room.



Market Day 2012

740 computers onsite – supported by 27 servers and the availability of Ultra Fast Broadband cabling down Windsor Road – resulted in the decision to activate the School's Network Update Project (SNUP) over the December 2014/January 2015 summer holidays. One outcome was the requirement for a much larger server room and there was no alternative but to once again move the Archive room into the former print room which does have the advantage of being air-conditioned, and placing the significantly bigger server and the printer into the original Continuing Education office. The decade ended with the completion of the two rooms upstairs in B (Art) Block to become a conference room and an extra classroom and an attractive staircase in order to reach them.

Otumoetai College is a well-resourced school by any national or international definition and this is as a result of very careful stewardship by four Principals, the various Boards and very competent ground staff.



Throughout the 2005-2014 decade the school structures in which the curriculum was delivered remained constant. The only exception was additions. What did change, however, was the process and means of delivery that took place both in and out of classes.

By 2005 both societal change and technological change had forced the Ministry of Education to conclude that the 1992 National Curriculum was in urgent need of updating. The past view of the curriculum was to transmit defined information and the 1992 curriculum had remained skill and knowledge focused. More was now demanded. Society was demanding young people be enthused and skilled to continue with lifelong learning and be creative in their thinking and questioning of knowledge.

The final years of the decade saw some staff involvement with helping to shape this curriculum nationwide and then as time went on and led by Bruce Farthing, full staff involvement as to how the revised curriculum would impact on Otumoetai College. The national document was completed by 2007 with a full implementation date of 2010. Central to this revised curriculum was the emphasis placed on growing 'key competencies'. They are Managing Self, Relating to Others, Participating and Contributing, Thinking and Using Language, Symbols and Text. More complex than skills, the competencies draw on knowledge attitudes and values in ways that lead to action. They are not separate nor stand alone. They are a focus for learning – and they enable learning in every classroom.

The curriculum document is a statement for a holistic education for the young of New Zealand. When placed beside the outcome of the local parent consultation, they are the two pillars that underpin the college's strategic plan. In 2010 a group of Year 9 students drew up their interpretation for the college and it has since come to symbolise what the local college stands for.

More concise achievement objectives were defined; in the revised curriculum a second language area was created and the Arts and Technology areas of the curriculum considerably expanded.

Additional Learning Programmes at the College for example in Health, Dance, Performing Arts Technologies, Digital Media and Digital Science, Robotics, Food Technology. Spanish followed from this development.

Most Professional Development Learning through 2005-2009 was focused on staff interaction with an

understanding of the new curriculum. It was a very significant shift in direction and given the quite general achievement objectives that related to secondary schools, there was always the danger of the 'enacted curriculum' remaining same old, same old with regard to teaching methodology. Full implementation was in 2010 and this was followed by full implementation of the NZQA's aligned standard assessment in 2011 for level 1, 2012 for level 2 and 2013 for level 3. The full implementation date of 2010 coincided with the 21st birthday of 'Tomorrow's Schools', and as was always intended by that structure, the school was responsible for ensuring the staff were up-to-speed.

The Education Review Office (ERO) would be the Crown's external agency for rating the school's performance and reporting to the college Board of Trustees. The school was visited by ERO three times during the decade – 2006, 2009 and 2013. The ERO reports were always very complimentary about management, teaching practices and student successes. Particularly successful features were regularly mentioned, for example the pivotal role of the Learning Centre and Pathways programmes in addressing the individual learning needs of students but a central theme has remained constant across the decade – the disparity of achievement results between Pakeha and Maori.

Addressing this issue was highlighted in the 2013 report and has become increasingly more urgent and therefore central to Staff Professional Development and Learning. Since her appointment to the staff in 2008, Pip Woodward has focused on leading the combined brief of Staff Professional Development and Maori Achievement. Pip has increasingly and rightfully married the two and as the decade closes in 2014 the college is working with the Ministry of Education's 'Building on Success' programme to gain traction. As a nation New Zealand has one of the greatest spread of education outcomes in the developed world – which is reflected at Otumoetai College.

The decade's 'additions' to the school curriculum were also of considerable significance particularly given that approximately 85% of the Year 9 intake will remain at school until the end of Year 13 and not all of these students are 'academically' focused. These 'additions' are facilitated learning in the practical vocational arena and have witnessed strong working relationships with a range of alternative providers. These opportunities have been facilitated by the Ministry of Education Funding regimes, eg. Secondary Tertiary Alignment

Funding (STAR) for by NZQA permitting 'Memorandum of Understanding' with outside providers for both instruction and assessment.

The college established close working relationships with the local BOP Polytechnic, and other providers of assessment material, who provide materials for learning programmes to be taught within the college and then set and grade the assessment materials. Examples of these courses are Marine Studies at both Years 12 & 13 and also Early Childhood.

Of even greater significance was the introduction of the national 'Gateway' programme in 2007. Being a decile 8 school meant that this college was one of the later schools to be signed up by the controlling arm of government - TEC (Tertiary Education Commission). The programme, which has been implemented by Kay Farthing HOD Pathways/Careers, provides government funding for a set number of students to gain both practical work placement and access to assessment of related vocational standard credits, in a vocation of their choice. Funded for approximately 80 students the college has regularly managed over 100 students in the programme. The programme has been very time consuming to implement because of initial interviews and tracking of all students.

The college's Pathways/Careers department has further made available work experience to even more students, worked with agencies to gain access to apprenticeships, established not only Employment Skills classes but also the Directions programme where students who are out of school on work placement can return on one or more days a week to work towards obtaining the all-important Literacy and Numeracy credits and other related vocational standards.

2014 saw the eventual establishment of the Western Bay of Plenty Trades Academy organised through the Western Bay of Plenty Secondary / Tertiary Committee, chaired by Bruce Farthing. Yet another government initiative, the Western Bay of Plenty was turned down on the first round of applications in 2009 but the eventual intervention of the local national MP's (both cabinet Ministers – Simon Bridges and Tony Ryall) brought success. Provisioned by the WBOP Polytechnic, the Trades Academy operates on the Polytechnic's Windermere Campus and in 2014 offered six one day a week vocational courses. The college selected Year 13 students in their second year of Early Childhood Studies as their initial uptake group. A separate funding, 'Cashed up Funding', means that the Trades Academy provider gains 20% of funding allocated to the student for one day's tuition while the College gains 80% to cover the balance of the week.

Another continuing development over the decade 2005-2014 has been the growth of offsite 'Alternative Education' run as a citywide government funded consortium with a set number of places allocated to each school – it has been administered by Otumoetai College for the 10 year period by Deputy Principals Robyn Pettigrew and Jude Brown. Intended for students who, for whatever reason, struggle to function in mainstream classes, it has an inadequate number of places and is poorly funded, paying staff at teacher-aide rates yet

with an expectation of full professional delivery and assessment of programmes. A few students have been successfully integrated back into the main stream with all credit due to the staff. The administration has taken considerable time for both Robyn Pettigrew and Jude Brown because of the requirement for all students to have an initial interview, the management of staff and resources and the eventual writing of an annual report.

A lack of government funding, led to the very short sighted 2009 decision by government to discontinue Continuing Education. Sue Hawkins had run a very successful programme for many years and in 2004 had the distinction of having her Otumoetai College profile for Adult and Community Education (AEC) used as a national exemplar by the Tertiary Education Commission of New Zealand. After the release of the government's decision the college briefly reviewed being able to sustain the programme without government funding but it soon became apparent that the economic figures would not stack up and hence the decision to shut it down. In a large suburban area with access to limited community opportunities, it was to the disadvantage of many.

In summary the staff's view of the last decade has been one of 'change' (not that there is anything wrong with change – just the 'pace of change'). There have been many new initiatives – each with their own merits – but those additions and the very few removals have led to an increasingly full professional life for staff.

The Deans' System

The Deans' system has remained central to the college's operation. The decade began with the appointment of two Senior Administrators - Iain McGregor and Christine Pearson who successfully for a decade have assisted the Deans at every level as they have had to manage an increasing range of complexities - social, behavioural and academic. This increasing complexity over the decade has been accompanied by an ever increasing use of outside agencies. The Ministry of Education's Group Specialist Education has seen regular applications for High and Complex Needs Funding and with the demise of Residential Schools (consequence of a government decision), applications for Intense Wrap Around Funding. These applications and then their subsequent success means hours of work finding staff and facilitating individual educational plans. The ever increasing growth of the Northern Health School and requests to the Ministry of Education for early exemptions are further evidence of a number of young people struggling to fit within the 'normal' programme, and the increased workload of Deans and Deputy Principals.

Deans' meetings have continued to operate throughout the decade but as the decade has moved forward they have increased in size. Chaired by a Deputy Principal at Years 9 & 10 in 2014 they are attended by the two year level Deans, the appointed Guidance Department representative for the year level, the HOD of the Learning Centre and the Advanced Learner Coordinator. At Year 11 a representative of the Pathways/

Careers Department is added but at Years 12 & 13 the HOD of the Learning Centre and Advanced Learner Coordinator no longer attend. Four Deputy Principals and five year levels has seen the Principal chair Year 13 and the Deputy Principal who has bought that year group through, return to bring in a new Year 9.

Just as the personnel in attendance has grown so has the number of tasks. Monitoring of student achievement has become an increasing focus, encouraged in 2012-2014 by the Ministry of Education's drive to ensure that all 18 year olds achieve NCEA Level 2. In order to raise national achievement the government has no alternative but to push forward with the target. Tools to assist this process have been developed. A computer program which uses to a traffic light indicator - green, orange, red to indicate whether students are on track to meet their target and improved staff ability to mentor students have been funded and supported by Professional Learning. Reporting 'tracking' progress to the Ministry of Education is a further pressure on the College to ensure success for these young people. The College signed up to the 'Behaviour for Learning' Framework initiative in 2012 and used the opportunity to focus on enforcing positive behaviour. Extended form periods over the last two years of the decade have been used to teach positive behaviours. A large involvement in the subject selection process and co-ordinating approaches to parents/ caregivers and outside agencies have now become an integrated part of agendas for Deans' meetings and extended out to all form teachers who are in much more regular contact with parents/caregivers than in past years.

Guidance

2003 saw Guidance, International and Pathways/Careers move into their new permanent home but by the end of 2014 they are 'bursting at the seams.'

Graham Leigh who gave thirty years' service to the Guidance Department retired in 2012 having given up the HOD position to Grant Nissen in 2005 and gone part-time. Grant in turn gave up the HOD position in 2013. Joy Maehe was appointed to the full time position of HOD Guidance for 2014. Helen Armstrong resigned in 2013. The team expanded to three (though Grant remained part-time). The Wellness Centre of which

Guidance is a part expanded to include a school nurse, a public health nurse, a physio and a medical doctor onsite once a week for two hours. Drug and Alcohol counselling has been available throughout the 10 year period.

Pathways/Careers – which has come to work closely with the Learning Centre and Guidance has also grown significantly under Kay Farthing's leadership, facilitating work experience and associated in-school programmes on an individual student basis.

Performance has remained an integral part of the life of music students. We have developed many groups over the last ten years. Students now have the opportunity to be involved in ensemble singing: girls' and boys' choirs, barbershop singing and mixed voice choirs. Our Symphonic Band is our largest performance group with numbers in the fifties some years. This group is a feeder band for our Jazz Band which is an auditioned group of senior students, very well-rehearsed and winner of many awards. We have also formed a development concert band for young or inexperienced players who are not quite ready for Symphonic Band but who are still keen to play with others.

Three years ago we formed a string orchestra which is gradually developing into an outstanding performance group. We also have involved our drummers and guitarists in percussion and guitar performance groups. Both of these groups have been wonderfully successful in providing a forum for large groups of students to develop leadership and team skills. They have also been an extreme crowd pleaser with the wider school community.

Otumoetai College has attended four International Festivals in Hawaii and Sydney, Australia. These were organised by World Projects and included performing in a range of interesting venues including the Sydney Opera House, adjudicated performances and workshops with internationally renowned conductors, and of course cultural exchanges with bands from different nations including Australia, USA, Japan, Canada and China. For all involved these festivals have provided a unique sense of community as a result of the fundraising and preparation for the group, the parents travelling with the group and the events themselves. The College parent community, in particular Deanne Stewart (mother of Brittany and Logan), Nikki Gorman (mother of Jack and Olivia,) Sue Neal (mother of Janita, Linda Ellis (mother of Lauren), and Jo Tisch (mother of Ellen and Luke) have been incredibly supportive of these ventures. We have even had Mr Randell 'drop in' on the travelling groups.

Rhapsody Rotorua is a wonderful international festival on our back door step that provides adjudication for individual group performances as well as combined inter-school exchanges; the students enjoy meeting musicians from both NZ and Australia. The Waikato Itinerant Festival, National Concert Band Festival and Big Sing are annual festivals where our students have excelled, often winning Gold Awards or festival specific awards.

Two of the most exciting series of annual competitions are the Smokefree Rockquest and Play it Strange Songwriting competitions. These are student driven competitions where musicianship no longer remains teacher directed but becomes student initiated. Our success at both regional and national level with Smokefree Rockquest and 'Play it Strange' has launched a number of our students into the professional world of music. our students' success throughout the year. The evening encompasses performance, exhibitions and awards for visual arts, technology, music, drama and dance. Deserving students are awarded colours, cups, trophies and scholarships. The Creative Arts Committee, with help from other students, manages this event. This is a time for the College to promote to their peers our creative side.

The academic music programme has seen great change over the last 10 years. Now that the curriculum and NCEA are firmly established so has the diversity in subjects offered. At the Junior School in Years 9 and 10 music remains a popular option choice. Students take a practical course and learn the beginnings of composition, performance and music theory which

In the Senior school we now offer at least two music subjects at each year level. These reflect student interest in performance – solo and group, composition, music works, recording techniques, aural and score reading. Academic results have remained consistently high and over the past four years have included scholarships in Music.

We have had the privilege of having outstanding staff employed in the school over the past ten years. Joanne Bain inherited the department and did a sterling job of setting up a solid base in which the department has developed and grown. Joanne and her partner returned to New Plymouth in 2003 and Vicky Jeffares was appointed Head of Department. Vicky started with only 20-30 students involved in Music. Her outstanding vision and infallible energy and enthusiasm have led to a team of wonderful staff contributing to the exciting, vibrant, and busy department we have today, catering to over 250 students school-wide. Our special thanks to Andrea Evetts, Lewis Martin, Jacquie Finney, Tracey Thorpe, Brenda Oakley and Kelly Hayward who have all contributed their talent and dedication to the department, and have all left such a positive impact on the school before leaving to further their careers and lives. Currently Matt Bodman, songwriter and performer, and Kelly McNamara, jazz guitarist and performer, along with Vicky are the dedicated staff forging a path for the current and future music students.

We have had a number of excellent workshops with some outstanding musicians including: Rodger Fox, David Squire, Shona Laing, Jeremy Redmore, Mike Chunn, Antony Jeffares, Joseph and Luke Thompson.

All these festivals give students an opportunity to practise regularly, perform, and most importantly build friendships with a common passion. The success of our students at these events is a reflection of the extensive rehearsal time, dedication and hard work of both students and staff in the Music Dept.

To this end we hold an annual 'Music Camp' at Matamata which has become a highlight for the students. This camp is over three days and provides all groups with an opportunity for uninterrupted rehearsal, playing on the water slides, master classes, mentoring, impromptu music performances, having a go on new or untried instruments or groups and having a great deal of fun over a weekend of shared music and performance.

Finally, ex-students of the College will be pleased to know that the Annual Talent Quest lives on. This event is produced by the Creative Arts Committee (Year 13 students) and has remained a highlight in the College Calendar. Not only is talent of the college showcased but the student committee prepare and manage the event, include the Art students in ticket and poster design, liaise with Mr McGregor about technical production and promote the event, all great learning experiences to produce a fantastic production.

We have developed and run many new initiatives throughout the last ten years. Our most important is the Creative Arts Awards which is an evening to celebrate





The Music staff has been ably assisted by our Arts Coordinator Leigh Johnston. Many of our endeavours would not be possible without her administrative support.

Music teaching staff are ably assisted by Itinerant Music staff who teach our students on a weekly basis. These teachers teach small groups of students in woodwind (flute, clarinet and saxophone), guitar, keyboard, drums, percussion, voice, strings (violin, viola, cello and double bass), brass (trumpet, trombone, euphonium, french horn and tuba) and bass guitar. Our teachers are a wonderful group who put in many hours coaching students through to solo and group performances for academic achievement, as well as giving up their weekends and evenings to contribute at camps, concerts, festivals and competitions. They form wonderful rapport with the students to help them reach their full potential. They have worked hard with the smaller groups of Year 9 students who are so new to the school and introduce them to the world of music.

All in all it has been a fantastic decade for the music department.

Drama

In 2003, Iain McGregor, the College's Drama teacher from 1985, handed the mantle over to Mandy Rowe, who was appointed to the staff from England. An experienced Drama teacher, Mandy's first production for the College was 2004's production of Return to the Forbidden Planet. The musical directors were Jason Ellwood, a Maths teacher and sometime-saxophonist, assisted by Sean Gaskell. We saw the first of many appearances by Joseph Thompson, as Captain Troy Tempest, Ryan King as Cookie and Michael Ralph as Ariel the Robot. The female lead was played by Sheree Moanaroa, who then went on the following year to lead an equally strong cast in Fame the Musical. The high energy, colourful show featured choreography by Year 11 student Michael Ralph, who was to be the first of many students to showcase their choreographic talents in an Otumoetai College show. Once more, we saw fresh talent emerging with Maia Potier's enchanting performance as Iris, Phillipa Perkins as Serena and the unforgettable portrayal of Mabel, by Sarah Newland.

Under Mandy Rowe's directorship alongside Musical Directors Petrina Thomas-Chisholm and Matt Bodman (both ex-students of the College) the College shows have continued to thrive, with *High School Musical* in 2007,

Jekyll and Hyde in 2009 and Footloose in 2011. High School Musical was the first show to be performed in the College's newly re-modelled Performing Arts Centre and was a complete sell out. We were entertained by Melanie and Matt Lee, a brother and sister duo, playing the brother and sister roles of Sharpay and Ryan. Other leads were impressively played by Antony Jeffares, Britney Stewart, Kirsty de Jong, Jonathan Perkins and Chase Douglas with Maia Potier stepping up as lead choreographer.

Jekyll and Hyde in 2009 saw a return to the Baycourt stage, with a stunning performance led by Matt Lee, Samantha Cotton and Charlotte McConnell. Choreography was capably led by Kelsey Henderson, who also went on to choreograph Footloose in 2011. Footloose was a high energy musical packed with dance numbers, which featured amongst others, the talents of Cole Ebeling, Luke Wison, Amelia McNabb and Abigail Moses.

The College took a slight change of direction in 2014, with Mandy Rowe taking on the role of Production Manager, whilst Matt Bodman took the role of Musical Director, working alongside our first out of College Directors, local talents Dave and Lisa Wilson. Their production of *Guys n Dolls* was very well received at Baycourt, showcasing once more a high level of skill amongst our students. Ella Sussex, Calista Nelmes, James Lellman and Josh Pereira led a talented cast, with Matthew Henderson as the larger than life Nicely-Nicely Johnson.

On alternate years, we were treated to a wide range of Junior and Senior plays during this time period such as Stepping Out, Gizmo, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, Our Day Out, Daisy's Disastrous Daydreams, The Golden Pathway Annual, The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole and Confusions. This, along with the end of year public performances required by NCEA, and the establishing of Lo Madas, the College's musical theatre group, has ensured a busy and varied schedule of Drama within the College.

In 2008, Mandy Rowe established Dance as part of the curriculum at Otumoetai College, alongside Performing Arts Technologies. This subject has gone from strength to strength, with showcases of Dance performances taking place twice annually. For the last four years, students have also choreographed and performed in the national Stage Challenge competition, under the guidance of Dance teacher, Jane Harnett. They have produced some stunning performances, gaining multiple placings and awards of excellence. Student leadership is a particular feature of this competition and has allowed the choreographic skills of many students to shine. Especially noteworthy were the efforts of Georgia Wilson, Remma McArdle, Amelia Scott, Becky Ellers, Jess King, Leilana Dunn, Paige Henderson and Milly Blake.

As the Drama department has grown, so too has the number of Staff. Currently there are 4 specialised Drama teachers at Otumoetai College, in comparison with 1.5 staff members in 2003 when Mandy Rowe arrived at the College.



Debating and Public Speaking

Since 2004, debating and public speaking has continued to flourish at college, with entertaining presentations from energetic and thoughtful participants. Students have competed in numerous competitions, from interclass / across school debates to the Manu Korero, and Royal Overseas League speech competitions. Under the continued tutelage of Sheena Millar, notable successes in this early time period included victories in 2004 at the regional Russell McVeagh Debating Competition for Daniel Miles, Sonja Farthing, and Richard Higgins. In speech competitions, Richard and Sonja came first and second in the local United Nations Speech Competition, with the former awarded second place in the national event.

The same two speakers enjoyed speaking success in 2005. Locally, Sonja Farthing reversed the result from the year before by winning the local United Speech competition, and then performed admirably in the Wellington final. Also, Sonja was awarded third place in the Royal Overseas League Speech Competition. In debating, successes came in the Bay of Plenty Interschool Competition with the senior team of Sonja Farthing, Richard Higgins, and Laura Fisher winning their argument with Katikati College. Also, the junior team of Philip Zander, Jennifer Fellows, and Ashley Ellis defeated their opponents.

Like those before her, in 2007 and 2008, Mikayla Zandstra enjoyed success in the United Nations Speech Competition. As a Year 11 student – and the youngest competitor – she achieved a commendable third placing in the local 2007 event, but went two steps further in 2008, beating students from across the region to qualify for the national final, where she was awarded a highly commended result.

In recent times, successes have come in the Waikato University Mooting Competition, the Lions Speech Contest, and the newly established Tauranga Debating Tournament. The 2012 mooting team of Aislinn Morris, Georgina Read, and Zac Klavs achieved an outstanding result, coming second regionally, while Zac was named best overall speaker. In 2013, Kurtis Boyed achieved success at the Waikato / Bay of Plenty level for the Lions competition, while in 2014 the junior 'A' debating team, comprised of Chloe Almey, Bradley Cornwell, and Carys Robson were the inaugural winners of the junior inter-collegiate competition, receiving the Helen Almey trophy.

As debating and public speaking have thrived at college, staff help in guiding students has been crucial. During these years they have been actively involved in preparing for competitions, from assisting with material to holding practice sessions, or providing transport. In particular, the following deserve recognition for their efforts: Sheena Millar, Emma Hall, Eloise Stephen, Hiriwa Curnow, Carolyn Dwight, Kim White, Ed Weston, Anna Gunson, and Aimee McNaughton.



Oteora, the college's outdoor education centre, has continued to be an important facility for the college.

In 2004 a decision was made to engage professional outdoor education providers to help run the Year 9 camp programme. This decision had the effect of taking some of the pressure of responsibility off staff while enabling them to more closely observe and interact with members of their form group. In this regard the college was fortunate for several years to be able to benefit from the excellent service provided by Gavin and Stacey from Adventurous Minds.

The campsite has also had use on an annual basis by Year 12 Biology students who use the setting for internal assessment studies. This has helped to promote the vision of Oteora as both an educational and a recreational resource.

2008 saw a successful move made to register the Oteora Trust Board as a charitable entity with the Charities Commission. This was consistent with the original intention of the campsite to be an educational and recreational resource for the benefit of people at the college or in the community. The acquisition of charitable status was also useful in helping to acquire financial support for further developments on the site.

These developments saw the creation of a toilet block, including flush toilets, in 2011 and 2012. Over the summer of 2012-2013 a new challenge/problem-solving feature was also constructed adjacent to the campsite. These developments enabled the campsite to safely cater


for increasing numbers of students while also enhancing their learning experience. Recognition must be given to the outstanding work of Lawrence Birks in helping to bring these developments to fruition.

The Trust Board is also very grateful for the financial support provided by Environment BOP, Bay Trust, Pub Charities and the Rotary Club of Te Papa. Without this assistance, these developments would not have been possible.

The changes to the campsite have been carefully managed so as to preserve the special nature of Oteora. As opposed to most other outdoor centres, Oteora provides an experience which may be seen as 'closer to nature'. Unless the weather dictates otherwise students sleep in tents. There is no electricity on site. Students cook their evening meals on gas cookers. Such an experience is a novelty for many 21st Century teenagers and is all the more valuable for being so.

It was pleasing to see the campsite included in an edition of the 'Country Calendar' TV programme in April 2014. It was also appropriate that Barry Dick featured in this programme in recognition of the huge time commitment which he has made over many years to Oteora.

As the college celebrates its 50th anniversary the Mackerseys, the Trust Board and college staff can reflect with pride on a facility that has been used by thousands of students. Although their time at Oteora was brief, many students remember it as a highlight of their college career.















- 2 & 3. The new Administration Block grows (2) front view; (3) back view.



































Sport is an integral part of college life at Otumoetai College. The work of the Sports Department (as opposed to PE) has grown significantly over the past 10 years.

The 2014 staff, led by Paul Braddock, comprise Abbie Johnson, Chris Matheson and Debbie McBride, with staff liaison, Stewart Henderson. Throughout the last decade Jenny Kirk and the late Noeline Stafford added a huge impetus to the department to put it where it is at the end of the decade. The evolution of the Executive Sports Committee (see Chapter 7) has added to the mana of sport at the college. It is difficult to cover all aspects of sport from each year individually, but the successes are highlighted in this chapter and as many of the achieving students and coaches as possible are recognised. Of necessity there is a concentration on the A teams or premier teams of a sport, but junior and lower grade teams' successes are also highlighted. The college magazine, 'Trek', is the annual record of team achievements for that year.

On the initiative of Stewart Henderson a Sports Foundation was established at Otumoetai College in 1998. The initiative was required due to the huge increase in the number of students wanting to participate in sport, the need to coordinate support for sport coaches, and the understanding that physical activity and teamwork provisioned through sport results in significant benefits to students' health, self-esteem and success. This was headed by Stewart Henderson who also continued to fulfil his teaching role at the college

An important progression in 2001 were the actions taken to formalise the Foundation into the 'Otumoetai College Sports Foundation' and a Board of Trustees was established, chaired by John Burke. Mrs Noelene Stafford was appointed as CEO to head the Trustees' Sports Office.

The Foundation's objectives were to maximise participation, support excellence, assist coaches and provide resources for administration and funding. The community was hugely involved and still is in providing coaches and management personnel for the many teams and individuals playing sport. Otumoetai College has grown its sport representative participation to an average 46% of the school roll. In 2014 the figure is 49%.

Significant funding by external charities in the early years of the Trustees' operation was achieved and then a national policy change saw schools no longer qualifying for this assistance.

In 2007 the Action Centre facility came under the management control of the Foundation's Sports office

staff which meant a much better integrated use for the school and community.

In 2008 Noelene Stafford retired and Jenny Kirk was appointed to the role. The Sports office staff continued to grow and well-known coach Paul Braddock joined in 2004, and Christine Matthewson in 2012. Jenny Kirk retired in 2013 and Paul Braddock was appointed to head the Sports office, and ex-student Abbie Johnson was appointed in 2014.

Regular meetings of the Foundation continued and a strategic plan was drawn up. However, the change in national policy meaning schools could not access external charities, and a change in the original membership of the trustees, meant that the initiative slowly ebbed away and all the real work was left to the Sports office staff. The decision was finally made to bring all sport back under the school's management, rest the Sports Foundation and disband its Board of Trustees. Its life had provided a useful purpose in highlighting the need for more efficient administration and coordination of all those involved in college sport, and its objective lives on today through the Sports office.

Athletics

In 2005, Stephen Buckley and Heather Peters travelled to the 4th World Youth Championships in Morocco. Stephen competed in the Octathlon and Heather in the Pentathlon.

2006 saw Val Bromley and Murray Chell coaching and the college produced 11 Bay of Plenty champions and five Waikato/

Bay of Plenty champions – Anna Fullerton, Amy Christophers, Tracey Hale, Michael Cochrane and Stephen Taylor.

In this great year for 'our athletics', Tracey Hale was national 80m hurdles champion, and 4 x 400m relay team of Tracey Hale, Anna Fullerton, Talia Andrews and Kylie Tietjens was also a national champion.

2007 and 2008 produced very little in the way of athletics achievements, but in 2009 six college records were broken at the college athletics sports – Kylie Tietjens, Mark Spalding, Emily McCormick, Janine Joyce (20 year old javelin record) and Jacob Marton, Senior boys 1500m and 3000m.

Only one record was broken at 2010 Sports – Anna-Lisa Uttley in 3000m Senior girls. This was the first time the new athletics track at the Domain was used. Athletes to achieve 1st in Bay of Plenty were Emma Jackson, Aneta Buckley, Claudia Richardson, Joseph Reynolds, Josh Mason, Nathanael Butler, Robert Sargent, Tamati Jory and Vanessa Hill.

2013 Athletics Sports saw three new records from Ollie Read – high jump, William Raisbeck – 200m and Jaysha Tippens – 3000m.

In 2014 our BOP winners were Junior Girls, Grace Nepia in the shot put, Jade Schiska in the discus, Claudia Richardson won the Senior girls high jump and Ruben Clinton won the Intermediate boys hurdles.

Basketball

This is a sport that has enjoyed highs and suffered lows over the last 10 years. Information about teams in 2005, 2006 and 2007 is very sketchy.

Boys

In 2008 the Senior A Boys finished 13th out of 20 at the regionals but won the final of the local competition beating Mount College. Standout players were Jed Misa and Matthew Bray. The Junior A finished the regular season 2nd in the local competition. Tournament week saw this team playing some of the best teams in the country and finishing 6th.

2009 saw the Senior A Boys finish 13th out of 22 in the National qualifying tournament involving teams from Bay of Plenty, Waikato and South Auckland.

In 2010 the college fielded six teams in the local competition (3 girls and 3 boys). The best result was the Junior Boys coached by Tim Ebeling, beating Tauranga Boys' in the final. In the regional competition they finished 12th out of 24 teams. The Senior Boys improved two places from the previous year to 11th.

2011 was an historic year for our Senior A Boys in the modern era. They won the Baywide competition beating Tauranga Boys' College in the final. At the BBNZ Zone 2 Premierships the team enjoyed two wins and then two losses to the top two teams and then had to play Tauranga Boys' College to qualify for the National Secondary Schools Tournament for the first time! Which they did!

The team placed 12th at Nationals. Standout players were Derone Raukawa, Alex Schipper, Theo Johnson, Adam Braddock, and Jamal McGreuer. In this year the Junior boys also won the Baywide title and finished 7th at the BBNZ Premier Tournament.

In 2012 coaches Andy Mackay and Tod Sharland had to refocus the team after a superb last year. The season was dogged by injuries and disruptions but again proved to be successful. The boys managed to qualify for Nationals by ousting the favoured Hamilton Boys' in a double overtime thriller. They finished 24th at the National Championship. Theo Johnson was selected in the NZ U18 team.

In 2013 the Senior A Boys finished 2nd in the local competition but did not quality for Nationals.

2014 saw both Junior and Senior A sides qualify for semifinals in the local Tauranga competition. The Senior A's finished 3rd in both the BOP and Tauranga competitions. The team, coached by Julie Adamson finished 8th in the BBNZ Zone 2 competition. Standout players were Jack Neale, Cameron Stewart and Landon Ebeling. The Junior A's, coached by Adam Braddock won the Tauranga Competition but placed 10th in BBNZ Zone 2 after an unfortunate count back in pool play. Standout players were William Raisbeck and Patrick Neale.

Girls

In 2005 the Junior Girls played in the Senior Grade of the local competition and finished 5th from 12 teams. Justine Kirk made the tournament team and Western Bay of Plenty Reps were Brooke Denham, Lisa Braddock and Shayla Whaiapu.

2010 saw the Junior Girls placed 6th in the Bay of Plenty Championship.

In 2011 the Junior Girls coached by Tim Ebeling, finished 3rd at the BBNZ Tournament and the top Bay of Plenty team. Kelcy Ballantyne, Nikita McGruer and Cydney Ebeling were selected in the Junior Girls' Tournament Team.

Kelcy Ballantyne and Cydney Ebeling have been our premier girls' basketballers in recent times and in 2012 Kelcy was selected in the New Zealand U16 Squad. She has subsequently made the U18 and U19 squads.

In 2014 Julie Castles coached the Senior A Girls to 3rd in BOP, and 11th in the BBNZ Zone 2 competition. Kelcy Ballantyne was the standout for this team. The Junior A girls were inexperienced but managed 4th in the Tauranga competition and 8th at BBNZ. Standout player was Renee Bennett.

Cricket

Cricket has a low profile at college but success can certainly occur – witness the rise to the Black Caps of Trent Boult from the college 1st XI.

Information on cricket is sketchy and we only have recent data to go on.

In 2011 Year 9 and 10 had success locally in the Gillette Cup before eventually losing to Gisborne Boys' High. The 1st XI only lost one game to finish 2nd in the Baywide competition. Standout players were Luke Erikson, Julian Bradley, Tim Klyen and Vaughan Wilson. Christian MacDonald was selected in the Bay of Plenty Junior team.

2012 saw the 1st XI again finish 2nd in the Baywide competition and four players posted centuries during the season – Julian Bradley, Christian MacDonald, Vaughan Wilson and Nathan Macdonald.

In 2013 the college had three teams playing. The 1st XI finished 1st equal in the Baywide competition with Vaughan Wilson the standout batsman with one 100 and three 50's.

2014 proved to be a rebuilding year with the team finishing 4th out of eight teams in the BOP College Division 1 Championship. Louis Morris was the best batsman and Luke Tatley the best bowler. The 2nd XI enjoyed a successful season, outstanding contributions coming from batsman Max Delaney (averaging 62) and bowler Jack Gordon.

Over the last 10 years, girls' cricket was only mentioned in one Trek, in 2008 when the team finished 3rd in the Northern Districts competition. The captains were Samantha Charlton and Abbie Johnson and the coach was Danny Hunter.

Football

Boys

In 2005 the 1st XI won the Linwood Cup for the first time since 1989, in a penalty shootout in the final. Isaac ter Ellen was the MVP.

In the local league, after a poor start and with only two players returning from last season, the team managed to finish 3rd.

At the 2006 tournament week the 1st XI finished 6th in the Rex Dawkins Cup, with the MVP being Oliver ter Ellen. Notable in this team was NZ Cricket Test fast bowler, Trent Boult!

2011 was a very successful season for the boys 1st XI. The team was undefeated in the Baywide Youth Premier Division. Rodrigo Mariante scored 42 goals. William Clague was best team member and Matt Hunter, player of the year. At the Papakura Satellite tournament the team finished 5th, losing only one game in a penalty shoot-out!

2012 saw the 1st XI gain 5th place in the Malcolm Cowie Tournament with Xavier Pratt the standout player.

2013 saw the team win the local league with only two losses in 15 games. One of the standout players was Brazilian Andrea Garcia and the coach was George Hylton. At the Malcolm Cowie tournament the team was 10th after a 3-way tie (3 wins and 1 loss) in section play saw them miss out on the quarter finals.

In 2014 the 1st XI finished 2nd in the BOP League missing out on the top spot by one point. Tournament week provided a big wakeup call for the team but they responded with some good wins before injuries and fatigue took their toll. Thanks must go to George Hylton for his coaching of the team for the last three years.

Girls

In 2005 the 1st XI coached by Simon Hayward and Sean Gaskell, won six of their eight games at Tournament to finish 4th.

The following year the girls' 1st XI again finished 4th at Tournament but they won the Baywide League with wins over Whakatane, Trident and Tauranga Girls' College, who they had never beaten before. The coaches this year were Simon Hayward and Graham Fullerton.

2007 was one of the best years for soccer at the college. The girls beat Trident 2-1 to qualify for the top girls' New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament. Injuries and sickness prevented repeating last season's league win and so the priority became the National Secondary Schools top tournament of 26 teams. The team finished a commendable 12th. One of the highlights was a 3-1 win over National Champions, Wellington East.

2009 again saw the team at the Premier Soccer Tournament where they finished 21st. Michaela Julius enjoyed a standout season leading the team.

All that is recorded for 2010 is that it was a wet and unpredictable season! The Girls' 1st XI were 2nd at the Taupo Tournament.

2011 again saw the girls playing in the Premier Tournament and placed 20th.

In 2012 the 1st XI finished 4th in their tournament week competition with the standout players being Marika Watt, Laura Poole and Brooke Matheson.

Brendon Honey coached the team in 2013 when the 1st XI won the bronze medal at the Maurice Hulme Satellite Tournament. Marika Watt was the captain and Brooke Matheson scored most of the goals!

Early in the 2014 season the team had to play off with Waikato Diocesan for a spot in the top tier winter tournament. The girls played well to win 8-0. Ranked 32 out of 32 for the Tournament, the young team finished 26th and was well pleased with its effort.

Golf

Golf at the college has flourished with staff input from Alistair Blair, Henry Dixon and Roy Ballantyne.

In 2005 the college team finished 5th in the Bay of Plenty Schools competition. In 2008 the college won this championship with the team of Damon Clark, Daniel White, Craig Hamilton and Sam Davis. This team went on to finish 5th at the NZ Secondary Schools Championship.

In 2009 the same team finished 5th at Nationals and then Sam Davis, Daniel White, Damon Clark and Brad Shaw attended the World Schools Golf Challenge in Adelaide. The team finished the top New Zealand school and 4th overall out of 80 schools. Craig Hamilton and Sam Davis were selected in the Bay of Plenty U19 Golf team.

2011 was another big year for golf at college with the team of Brad Shaw, Regan Anderson, Chris Charlton,

Cody Joss, Hayden Henderson and Finlay Balmer-Allen heading off to South Africa for the World Schools Golf Challenge again. The boys' Golf Pennants team of Andrew Jackson, Jack Tisch, Jamie and Hayden Henderson finished 2nd in the Bay of Plenty finals. Brooke Polley took out 3rd overall Nett at the New Zealand age group championships held at Oamaru.

In 2012 our golf team competed at the Asia Pacific Golf Challenge in Melbourne. The team comprising Jordi Langton, Kane Davies, Hayden Henderson and Jimmy Adams won the teams' Nett Competition. The best individual performer was Jack Tisch. Also, this year saw Chris Charlton finish 2nd in the New Zealand U19 Championships.

2013 saw Chris Charlton successful again, coming 2nd in the Golf South Island stroke play competition.

In 2014 the college competed in several golf competitions during the year but successes were few and far between!

Gymnastics

This is a sport run mainly outside the college because of the need for proper safe facilities. Recently the sport has enjoyed a higher profile due to some outstanding individuals.

In 2010 Scott Butler earned a spot in the New Zealand Artistic Gymnastics team to tour Australia.

2011 saw Samara Maxwell selected in the New Zealand team to compete in Chicago at an International Gymnastics meet. She was 5th on the beam, 7th in the vault and 12th on the bar, and in 2013 she competed at the Australian Nationals in Sydney.

In 2014 our young team of Kodi Fairhurst, Teresa Iaccarino and Stephanie Gillard finished first team in their level.

Hockey

Boys

Although not having quite the same profile as the girls, the boys' hockey has experienced some success over the years.

In 2005 the 1st XI qualified for Division 1 in the local competition and played in the third ranked Johnson Cup, finishing 13th out of 16. Standout players were Alan Whiteman (Midlands U21 and Tauranga Men) and younger players, Ian Daniel, James Libeau, Alex Sutherland and Andrew Cameron. The coach was Gavin Morgan.

In 2008 the college Senior boys enjoyed a great local season with only one loss. They beat Tauranga Boys' College in the final to win for the first time in 12 years. The coach was former student, Anne Mackersey.

2009 saw four teams representing the school. The 1st XI was relegated back to the Mayhill Cup after being promoted last year. Rep players were Mark Whitaker, Hayden Bruin, Michael Whiteman, Cory Bruin and Gareth Stewart.

In 2010 the 1st XI travelled to Levin to play in the Mayhill Cup. The boys enjoyed some good wins and close losses to finish 15th.

2011 saw the 1st XI coached by Lynne Whitaker, compete at the Mayhill Cup in Napier and finish 12th. The following year, a rebuilding one, saw the team coached by Hamish Ashton, finishing 11th in the same competition.

2013 saw the 1st XI win the Andy Hayward Cup and finish 12th in the Mayhill Cup. Standout players were Ruskin Young, Tyler Bruin, Jack Dey, Zac Cole and Mark Aldcroft.

The 1st XI struggled for playing numbers in 2014 but finished 12th in the Mayhill Cup. Thanks go to coaches Richard Dey and Ian Hemmingsen.

The 2nd XI were runners up in the Stephen Graham Cup as well as the Andy Haywood Cup.

Girls

The girls' hockey programme has continued to flourish at Otumoetai College due to the input of Alan Galletly. Our girls' teams are always challenging the domain of the large single-sex girls' schools.

In 2005 the Girls' 1st XI had to challenge and beat Gisborne Girls' High (3-0), for a place in the Marie Fry Tournament. At the tournament they finished 13th so would face another challenge in 2006. Claudia Bell was the team captain and Anna Libeau was selected in the New Zealand Tiger Turf U16's.

Information is sketchy over the next three years but 2009 proved to be an exceptional year for girls' hockey. The 1st XI won the Gilmore Trophy in 2008 enabling them to play in the Division 2 Marie Fry tournament. At the tournament, after a patchy season, the team won five out of the six games, lost to Christchurch Girls' and finished 3rd, good enough for promotion to the top division. Outstanding players in this team were Samantha Charlton (future Black Stick), Abbie Johnson (NZ Maori U21) and Emma Jackson. Both the 2nd XI coached by Paul Collins and 3rd XI coached by Alicia Horan and Russell Horan, enjoyed successful seasons.

The high or low light of the season for the 2010 1st XI was being caught in the massive Christchurch September earthquake and surviving! It was a rebuilding year for the team. They played in the Federation Cup but really failed to fire, finishing 13th and were demoted for the following season. The 2nd XI finished 9th in the Chris Arthur Cup in Wellington.

2011 was one of the best years for girls' hockey with three of the four teams reaching the finals of the Tauranga Hockey Association finals.

The Year 9 team coached by Abbie Johnson never lost a game all season. The 3rd XI

coached by Craig Carter, and the 2nd XI coached by Dean Brady, both enjoyed successful seasons.

The 1st XI coached by Alan Galletly, won both rounds of the Tauranga Hockey Association's competition and appropriately, the Jo Galletly Trophy for the best team in the Bay of Plenty. Outstanding players were Emma Jackson, Anna Charlton, Aneta Buckley and Paige Sly. The team finished 5th at the Marie Fry Tournament in Whakatane.

2012 saw four teams in the local finals with the 9A team beating the 3rd XI in the final of the college grade. The 2nd XI, just lost to Aquinas in the 1st XI grade and the 1st XI played Otumoetai in the Senior Women's final. The 9A team was coached by Mark Tingey and enjoyed an extremely successful season, gaining promotion to the college 1st XI grade. The 2nd XI coached by Ross Hamlyn finished 5th in the Mary Clinton Tournament against 15 other 1st XI's. The 1st XI were a very young team (losing nine players from last season) but finished 1st in their pool at the Marie Fry Tournament, ending up 8th.

2013 was an up and down season for the 1st XI, but with a tough section at the Marie Fry Tournament featuring a one goal loss to the eventual winners, Westlake Girls', a win against MAGs and a draw against Rangitoto, they eventually finished 10th to stay in the tournament for the next year. The 2nd XI won the bronze medal at the Mary Clinton Cup.

2014 saw four girls' teams playing in the local Tauranga Hockey competition. The 3rd XI were 2nd in their competition. The Year 9 enjoyed a successful season playing in the senior competition against other schools 1st and 2nd XI's. The team was coached by Ceri Blears-Woodcock. The 2nd XI, coached by Simon Ward, won the Gemma Flynn Cup and finished 5th in the NZ Hockey Association's 2nd XI competition. The 1st XI, fielding eight new players, set the goal of retaining their place in the Marie Fry Division of the National Tournament. Wins against Burnside (Christchurch), Craighead Diocesan saw them make the top eight and eventually finish 7th and retain their place in the top tournament for 2015. Georgia Craig, Stephanie Nielsen, Siennah Cowles, Sophie Tingey, Grace Burnett and Sophie Gordon played in the Tauranga U18 team that finished 5th at Nationals.



Netball

Netball continues to involve a huge number of girls in a large number of teams in the local Harbourside competition. It also continues to develop school-aged coaches and referees. Staff member Lara Richardson has put in a lot of energy and time over the last 10 years in fostering the sport at college.

In 2005 the Premier team was 3rd in the Baywide competition and 8th in the B grade of Upper North Island Secondary Schools (UNISS) Tournament, and they won the Collegiate Championship from Tauranga Girls' College. Rep players were Bay of Plenty U19 Gold Rachel Morgan, Bay of Plenty U17 Gold Hannah Croad, Sophie Schuler and Tracy Braddock. U15 Gold players were Amy Christophers and Tiffany Ward.

In 2006 there were 13 teams in the local competition. The Premier 1's enjoyed a most successful season, finishing 2nd in the Bay of Plenty and made the finals of their division at North Island Secondary School Competition with nine wins and one loss, which moved them into the A division for 2007.

In 2008 the Premier 2's, Junior A and 9C won their divisions in the local league. The Premier 1's had a tough rebuilding year but on a positive note Amy Christophers was selected in the New Zealand Secondary Schools' team. The Junior A team won their local competition beating Tauranga Girls' College in the final. MVP was Alex Gardiner.

2009 proved to be an exceptional year for college netball. The college was named Netball BOP Secondary School of the Year and Lara Richardson, Secondary School Administrator of the Year. Ang Hays-Johnson (Junior A Coach) was named Junior Coach of the Year and Mayleen Tukaokao (co-coach of Premier 1), Volunteer of the Year. The Premier 1's were runners-up in the college A grade, 4th in the Baywide and 4th in Division 2 at UNISS. Rep players this year were Amy Christophers (NZ SS Team), Kylie Tietjens and Talia Andrews.

In 2010, 14 teams played in the Harbourside Competition. In the UNISS B grade the Premier 1's finished 14th. Abi

May was selected in the New Zealand U17 Tournament team.

2011 saw 15 teams in the local competition. Inconsistency cost the Premier 1 team a place in the Harbourside finals and at UNISS they were 15th. Rep players were Talia Connal BOP U19 Gold and Abi May U17 Gold. Year 13 student, Michael Rolleston won the Harbourside Student Umpire's Award.

2012 was a similar type of season with 16 teams in the local competition, seven coached by senior students. The Premier 1's were 5th in Harbourside, 8th in the Baywide competition and 27th in B grade at UNISS.

2013 proved to be a more successful season with 17 teams in Harbourside competition (seven students coaching). The Premier 1 team was 4th in B grade at UNISS (19th overall).

2014 saw 19 teams in the local competition. The Premier 1 team finished 16th in the B grade at UNISS. Michaela Isaac and Olivia Young played for the WBOP U17 team. There were nine student coaches this year at the college.

Rowing

This sport has maintained a steady profile over the years due mainly to the efforts of Anna Shaw promoting the sport.

In 2005 there were 48 rowers and coxswains. The National Indoor Rowing championships were part of the College Games in Hamilton. Sarah Hamilton won the silver medal in the U19 Girls' Lightweight 500m. At the North Island championships Ethan Bray and David Horan won gold in the U15 Double. At the NZ Secondary School's championships (known as Maadi) on Lake Karapiro the U15's eight took the bronze medal.

In 2006 there were 46 rowers and at the North Island Championships teams reached 7A finals and 4B finals – unfortunately there were no medals.

In 2007 there were only 21 rowers and only one boy! The most successful crew was the U18 lightweight four

In 2008 there were 17 boys and seven girls rowing. The Boys' U15 quad ended up 12th in New Zealand.

2009 saw 22 rowers. Kimberley Pilbrow broke the New Zealand record for the Girls' U15 2km indoor rowing at the College Games, and Ethan Inglis won two silvers and Theresa Steiner a bronze at the same event.

Ethan Inglis and Jeffrey Brayshaw won gold at the North Island Championships and silver at NZ Secondary School's Championships in the Boys' U15 double sculls. They were coached by Toby Patton.

In 2010 the college rowing moved from Tauranga Harbour to Bay Coast Rowing on the Wairoa River. At the North Island Championships, Ethan Inglis and Jeffrey Brayshaw won gold and these two joined Matt Dearsley, Jamie Moor and cox Regan Phillips, to finish 4th in the U16 Boys' quad. Leah McMahon and Megan Thurlow won bronze in the U16 Girls' double. The weather at Twizel ruined NZ Rowing Championships but the U16 quad managed 6th and Josh Houlton 6th in the U17 single.

In 2011 rowing numbers were down but Ethan Inglis and Jeffrey Brayshaw managed a silver in the Boys' U17 double sculls. At NZ Secondary Schools Championships all the boys reached B finals and Holly McNab and Kendall Hofland just missed out on the A final, but won the B final to finish 9th overall in the U15 double.

2012 was a rebuilding year with 14 new rowers and a set of mixed results.

2013 was more positive with 16 rowers. At the North Island Championships Jackie Van der Velden and Zoe Stevenson made the A final then joined Courtney Dyer and Lauren Dance in the quad that also made the A final. Kendall Hofland and Rosie Van der Velden in the U18 double and Jamee Lynds and Hannah Ouellet in the U16 double also made A finals.

The 2013/2014 season started with 11 rowers. Nick Pilbrow in the U17 single and Nick and Dylan Ngatai in

the U17 double made the A finals. The NZ Secondary Schools Chjampionships were in Twizel and the small squad was pleased to achieve five A finals.

Rugby

Over the past 10 years Jamie Davis, Richard Brown and Paul Braddock have put a huge amount of time and effort into promoting rugby at Otumoetai College.

2005, in the words of coach Jamie Davis, was an average one. Player of the year was Lewis Hancock, scoring 130 points. Bay of Plenty Reps along with Lewis were Paul Tietjens, James Meyrick, Sam Turner and David Horan.

In 2006 the 1st XV played a Chiefs Super 14 curtain raiser at Waikato Stadium. The team also won the second round of the Baywide 1st Division. In Sevens the team won the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Sevens title, beating Te Puke 25-12 in the final. Tries to Tupu Clarke, Paul Tietjens and Cody Bryant sealed the victory.

2008 saw the team play in another Chiefs curtain raiser at Waikato Stadium, against Waiuku. They also defeated St Andrew's, a touring Australian team. The team finished 3rd in the Baywide competition and Kane Parker finished a 2-year stint as coach. Taylor Jones was 1st XV Player of the Year. The college also fielded two Under 70kg teams and two teams in the U14 Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Competition.

For the 2009 season, coach Richard Brown organised eight pre-season games for a relatively inexperienced team, with some success as the team finished 3rd in the Baywide competition. Standout players were Cory Brown (captain), Cameron McQueen, Hayden Jenkins and Will Mangos.

2010 saw an U15 XV attend the Gold Coast Rugby Carnival. Sixty teams played in four divisions. The college played in the top U15 division, finishing 3rd, with three wins and three losses. The 'Spirit of Rugby' cup was won by Ryan Henstock. This was a very successful

year for the college teams with the 1st XV winning Division 2; U15's winning Division 1 and the 2nd XV runners-up in the 2nd XV division in the inaugural Baywide finals. This year a rugby invitational team attended the inaugural Toll Cup Competition.

In 2011 the 1st XV, coached by Jamie Davis and Paul Braddock, earned promotion to Division 1 and made it all the way to the finals of the Baywide Competition. The team suffered only two losses during the season. Jay Michalick and Jamal McGruer made the Bay of Plenty U18's and Aidan Ross the Bay of Plenty U16's.

The 2nd XV, coached by Jeff Kildare and John Baird, managed to win through to the top division. The U14's, coached by Trevor Grainger, finished top of Division 3. The U15's, coached by David Collis and Cody Bryant, made the top four of Division 1 but lost in the semi-final.

In 2012 the U14's finished 7th of 17 teams in the Baywide competition, thanks to the coaching of Paul Braddock and John Stanley, and the 1st XV finished 3rd in the Baywide competition, losing in the semi-final 22-20 to Trident. Bay of Plenty U16 Reps were David Irwin, Matt Ensor, Josh Kingsford and Sam Redmayne.

2013 was a memorable season for the 1st XV. The team was unbeaten in the Baywide Competition, won the Western Bay of Plenty Shield, the Dick Littlejohn Cup,

The U15 team finished 6th in the BOP U15 top division. Joel Wisnewski and Ash Henstock made the WBOP U15 Rep team.

Swimming

Over the years the college, along with the Otumoetai College Swimming Club, has produced a plethora of superb swimmers, foremost among them Olympian Moss Burmester.

In 2005 the college team won the overall title at the Bay of Plenty Swimming Championships, winning the boys' event and picking up 2nd place in the girls'. Notable swimmers were Ashley Ellis, Tiffany Ward, Jarrod Evans and Jeremy O'Shannessy.

In 2006 ten college records were broken by Ashley Ellis, Tiffany Ward (2), Gabrielle Capp (3) and Anneke Jenkins (4). Bay of Plenty champions were Ashley Ellis and Tiffany Ward.

At the National Age Group championships in 2009, Taylor Armstrong achieved a New Zealand record in the 15-year 100m backstroke. She won four golds at this event. Holly Boyle won two golds and Nathan Capp won four silvers in the U16 Boys. Taylor has gone on to achieve a swimming scholarship in the USA university system and Nathan was selected for the Youth Olympics.

2010 saw further representative honours for Nathan Capp, being selected for the New Zealand Swim team to compete in the Trans-Tasman Series. Both Nathan and Taylor achieved great results at the New Zealand Age Group Championships. Taylor broke five Bay of Plenty records at the event.

2011 saw Taylor Armstrong break seven school records. At the Bay of Plenty Championships she gained three 1st placings. At the New Zealand Short Course Championships she achieved a New Zealand Age group (Under 17) record for 100m freestyle, nine Bay of Plenty records and two Open Bay of Plenty records.

2012 saw the college team again win the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Mixed Team Trophy. Kelcy

Ballantyne achieved four 1st places, Brittany Goodrick and Stephanie Capp three 1st places each.

2014 proved to be a record-breaking year with 12 records broken. Thomas Chaney, the junior swimming champion broke six of them and Josh Pickett, the intermediate champion four! Thomas went on to compete in the Secondary Schools Nationals, securing 1st in 200m breaststroke and 200 Individual Medlay. Keeley Jones, George Culling, Connie-Pearl Anderson and Tem Strickland all gained medals in Division 2. Thomas, Joshua and Claudia Capp were all placed at the National Age Groups in Wellington, Thomas securing two 1st places and Joshua three! Congratulations to Tem Strickland who swam at the Youth Olympics in Nanjing, China for the Cook Island team.

Volleyball

Volleyball continues to be the major profile sport played at Otumoetai College, with success at both junior and senior levels in both the boys and girls. Several of our players are now overseas, playing in either the USA University system or in Europe. The strength of the programmes at Otumoetai is the continuity of coaching staff with Anthony Gadsbey, Shane Blake and Sam Kirk on the boys' side and Stewart Henderson, Keith Macown, Jenny Kirk, Mary-Ann Braddock, Tracey Braddock and Lisa Braddock along with senior students, on the girls' side.

Girls

In December 2004 the Senior A and B girls competed in the Australian Schools Cup with the A team finishing with the silver medal and the B team 7th. The team also won the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Team of the Year in 2004. The Junior A team won the Bay of Plenty and North Island titles, defeating Upway (from Australia) in the final. Four players in the North Island tournament team were Hannah Croad, Tracey Braddock, Lana Marsom and the MVP was Rachael Morgan.

The Senior A team lost the 2005 final to Tauranga Girls' (the team had beaten Tauranga Girls' four times during the season and lost the fifth time!). Shannen Bagge, Simone Head, Renee Hardley and Rachael Morgan were all selected in the New Zealand Tournament team and the New Zealand Junior Women's Team to contest a test series against Australia. Shannen Bagge and Simone Head headed off to the USA on volleyball scholarships, joining Lauren Fleury and Taina Savage.

In 2006 the Junior A finished 2nd in the Bay of Plenty and 4th at North Island Championships with Jessica Arundel making the Tournament Team and subsequently the New Zealand U17's.The Senior A won the Bay of Plenty title and the final at Nationals was a replay of the 2005 final, but this time Otumoetai won 3-0. Justine Stovald, Jade Stamp and Leigh McDonald made the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament team and Rachael Morgan was the MVP. These four were also selected in the New Zealand Junior Women's Team.

In 2007 the Junior A won the Bay of Plenty title, but lost in the semi-final at North Island Championships to Trident 2-1. Amy Christophers and Samantha Charlton were selected in the North Island Tournament Team. The Senior A girls won the Bay of Plenty Championship but lost in the semi-final to McCauley 3-1. Rachael Morgan, Hanna Croad and Jade Stamp were selected

in the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament Team. In December 2007 the Senior A played in the Australian Schools Cup and beat all the Australian teams (including Heathfield twice) to come up against McCauley High from New Zealand who had beaten us at the New Zealand Secondary Schools event earlier in the year. Again we lost 3-1, to win a fifth silver medal at these championships. The Senior B team, coached by Keith Macown, finished 4th in Division 1, an outstanding result for a college B team. Rachael Morgan was selected as the MVP for the Girls' Honours Division. Rachael took up a four-year USA volleyball scholarship to Florida State where she led the team to a top 4 finish in the final year of her scholarship. She has probably been the most successful volleyball player to leave New Zealand and play in the USA system.

2008 saw the 10A finish 3rd in the Bay of Plenty but 13th in the North Island, the lowest position for some years. The Senior A probably had its worst Bay of Plenty Championship, finishing 5th with two wins and eight losses! (Three of the losses were 3-1 and five were 3-2!) Seeded 10th at Nationals, the team beat 7th seeds, Cashmere in five sets and then got thrashed by McCauley before winning the 3 of 4 quarter against Riccarton, and the semi-final 3-1 against Waimea, before losing in the final to McCauley 3-1. Jess Arundel, Amy Christophers and Rachel Yardley were selected in the tournament team. Melissa Cairns made the New Zealand U17's.

The 2009 season started with the Junior A's finishing 4th in the Bay of Plenty, 5th at the North Islands, losing the quarter final to Upsway (Australia). Melissa Cairns and Aneta Buckley were selected in the North Island Tournament Team. This year at the College Games played in Hamilton, the team had three wins and two losses, it was a learning experience for a new team. The Senior A started with a 4th placing at Bay of Plenty Championships. At Nationals the semi-final against Waimea was a heart-breaking 3-2 loss, 15-13 in the fifth

set after changing ends 8-2 down! Waimea went on to win the final 3-0 and the college won the bronze medal. Rachel Yardley and Amy Christophers were selected in the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament Team. New Zealand U19 players were Rachel, Amy, Casey Freed and Alyse Barclay. New Zealand U17's were Alyse, Melissa Cairns and Talia Conner.

In 2010, at the Junior Bay of Plenty Championships, the Junior A finished champions and the 9A team were 9th. At the North Island Championships the Keith Macown coached team won the gold medal, beating Bethlehem College 26-24, 25-23 in a thrilling final. Holly Boyle and Katie Wood were selected in the North Island Tournament Team and Amy Hunter was MVP. The Senior A were always likely to struggle, losing six players from the previous year, but started well by finishing 2nd in the Bay of Plenty. At Nationals the team started well by winning their first six games, however in the quarter final they lost to Hillcrest, a team containing two Year 14 players waiting to go on USA scholarships. After this, the team seemed to lose heart, losing 3-2 to Waimea in the next game before losing 3-0 to Matamata in the play-off for 7th and 8th. This was the worst finish for the college A team for some years. The Senior B won Division 3, winning all of their nine games. Alyse Barclay, Amy Hunter and Aneta Buckley played for the New Zealand Junior Women's team at the Asian Championships. Melissa Cairns and Aneta Buckley were in the New Zealand U18's at the Asian Youth Games in Kuala Lumpar.

In 2011 the Junior A team finished 4th in the Bay of Plenty and went to the North Islands ranked 6th. The team made it to the final after a crucial quarterfinal win, 2-0 versus Kawerau and a semi-final win against the Mount. The final was a 2-1 loss to Mangere. Julia Hartley, Emma Dwight and Te Pae Oporo were selected in the North Island Tournament Team. The Senior A team finished 4th this time in the Honours Division of

the Australian Schools Cup. Nationals this year was unbelievably close. After winning six section games and the quarter final against Manurewa and semifinal against Marlborough Girls', the team came up against defending champions, Tauranga Girls' College. Otumoetai College won the first two sets before losing momentum in the third set, 25-23 and the game 3-2. The Senior B, coached by Mary-Ann Braddock was 4th in Division 2 (20th in New Zealand). Alyse Barclay, Amy Hunter and Melissa Cairns were all selected in the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament Team and now they are all on volleyball scholarships in the USA.

In 2012 the Junior A's, coached by Keith Macown, finished 3rd in the Bay of Plenty and were seeded 4th at North Islands. Unfortunately, the team lost in their quarter final to Tauranga Girls' College but recovered to finish 5th. The Senior A team retained only three players from the previous season so fronted up well to finish 3rd in the Bay of Plenty and therefore seeded 5th at Nationals. The team won their first six section games, including a 5-setter against Marlborough Girls', a quarter final 3-0 against Waimea and in an epic semi-final beat Bethlehem College 3-2 set scores (27-25, 23-25, 25-18, 28-30, 15-13) in a physically and mentally draining game. The team lost in the final to Tauranga Girls' College 3-1 (29-27 in the 4th set), to win the silver medal again. The highlight of 2012 was the Senior A's trip to the USA High Performance Championship in Des Moines, Iowa, USA.

2013 was a hugely successful year when the Junior A's, coached by Stewart Henderson, won the Bay of Plenty title and then went on to win the North Island Junior title, beating arch rival Tauranga Girls' College 2-0 in the final. Roebi Bidois and Kahla Tyson made the Tournament Team and Jasmine Tawa was the MVP. Only five players returned from the previous year for the Senior A's and five Year 10 players were promoted from the 2012 North Island Championship winning Junior A team. The team lost in the first of the Bay of Plenty Championships to Tauranga Girls' College 3-0, before beating them in the second round 3-2, and so won the Bay of Plenty title. At Nationals, six section games were won including a five-setter against Mt Maunganui. The quarter final was also a five-setter against Waimea, before a semi-final win against Westlake and a final 3-1 against Christchurch Girls' to win Otumoetai

girls' 13th National title. Abbie Meredith, Claudia Richardson and Kelcy Ballantyne were selected in the Tournament Team. Emma Dwight was a proud member of this team. She was also the top PE scholarship student in

Otumoetai College Senior A (winners), B and C Boys Volleyball Teams at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Volleyball Championships 2008 the country and is now on an academic scholarship at Harvard University.

2013/2014 season started with the 10A team, coached by Keith Macown wining the BOP title and losing in the final 2-1 to Manurewa. Sophie Sampson and Grace Burnett were selected in the NI Tournament team. In November 2013 the Senior A girls' team received the BOP Secondary Schools Team of the Year at the annual BOP Sports Awards. In December 2013 the Senior A and B teams headed to Melbourne for the Australian Schools Championship. Six pool wins put us into the semi-final against Craigslea which was lost in a close game. The team won the 3/4th playoff for the bronze medal. The B team finished 4th in the division below Honours. The Senior A at the start of 2014 won the BOP title beating a strong Mount side in the final. At Nationals the Senior B team coached by Mary-Ann Braddock was 12th – a superb achievement. The Senior A team came through pool play unscathed but the quarter final was a fivesetter against Orewa. All the other quarters were four or five-setters showing the standard of the competition. The semi-final was a 3-0 against Rangitoto. The final against Waimea was a 3-2 loss, despite winning the first two sets - shades of 2011! Claudia Richardson and Kelcy Ballantyne were selected in the NZ Secondary Schools Tournament Team. Our represenative players this year were Claudia, Kelcy and Kahla Tyson NZ U19, Roebi Bidois and Jasmine Tawa NZ U17, Emily Farron NI U19 and McKenna Armstrong, Sophie Sampson and Kahu Te Kani NI U17.

Boys

At the end of 2004 the Junior boys were 3rd in the Bay of Plenty and 3rd at the North Islands Championships Edwin O'Dea making the North Island Tournament toam

In 2005 with five players returning from 2004, the team started slowly but ended up winning the national title in five sets against Tauranga Boys', the Bay of Plenty Challenge Trophy and the Schroeder Cup. Standout players who made the Tournament Team were Thomas Cully, Robert Burley (MVP at Nationals), Charlie Stewart and Tim Kirk. Thomas, Robert, Charlie and Rob Cairns were selected in the New Zealand Junior team to play Australia.



2006 started well with Junior boys coming 2nd in the Bay of Plenty Championships and 3rd at the North Island Championships again. This time Sam O'Dea made the Tournament team. In the Senior A, only three players returned from the victorious 2005 team but the team still managed a 3rd in the Bay of Plenty and 4th at Nationals. Tim Kirk and Charlie Stewart were selected in the New Zealand Junior Men's team and Sam and Edwin O'Dea in the New Zealand U17's.

In 2008 the Senior A team, after a successful trip to the Australian Championships, won the Bay of Plenty Championships, the Bay of Plenty Challenge Trophy and the Schroeder Cup. At Nationals the first six games were all 3-0 wins followed by a quarter final 3-1 win against Riccarton and a 3-0 semi-final win against De La Salle. In the final against Tauranga Boys' College with the game one set each and the college 11-1 down, up stepped Ben O'Dea to serve 11 points in a row and from that point on the team took control to win 3-1 and the National title. Sam O'Dea was MVP and Logan King and Ben O'Dea were selected in the Tournament Team.

Sam O'Dea is now playing professionally on the Asian Beach circuit with partner and ex-Otumoetai College player, Mike Watson.

In 2009 the team achieved a 5th placing at Nationals. An unfortunate five set loss to tournament favourites, Tauranga Boys' in one of the best games of the tournament at the quarter final stage, meant that 5th place was the highest the team could achieve. Ben O'Dea made the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tournament Team. Ben now plays professionally in Europe. Rep players this year were Griffin Muller and Andrew Bray for New Zealand U17's. Michael Paine and Will Mango,s New Zealand U18's and Ben O'Dea and Reuben Gillard, New Zealand U19's.

2010 saw the Senior A team finish 3rd at the Bay of Plenty Championships and 6th at Nationals, losing to Tauranga Boys' College in the play-off for 5th and 6th. Charlie Clague was selected in the New Zealand U17's.

The 2011 Championships were disappointing for the Senior A team, who lost to a lower ranked team in the first game of the tournament and despite winning the

remaining section games, ended up in Division 2 which they won easily. The boys' B team finished 6th in Division 2.

In 2012 the first game at Nationals against Manurewa was won and so were the other section games. Unfortunately, a loss against Trident meant a tough quarter final against silver medallists Western Heights. The loss here meant the team could finish only 5th as they did with two good wins against Waimea and Hastings. James Gilling made the New Zealand Secondary

Schools Tournament Team and Charlie Clague again made the New Zealand U17's.

In 2013 the team finished 4th in Division 1 with Daryl Lewis captaining the New Zealand U19 team. Liam Matheson also secured a four-year volleyball scholarship at Brandon University in Canada. At the end of 2013 the Senior boys also travelled to Melbourne to play in the Australian Schools Championship. The team ended up in a strong pool and eventually finished 9th but found they were very competitive with the top Australian teams.

2014 saw the Senior A team, coached by Sam Kirk finish 3rd in a very strong Bay Competition. At Nationals the first six pool games were won, including a five-setter against Tikipunga. The quarter final was 3-0 against Trident and in the semi-final against Mount the team played their best volleyball of the season to beat a team they had lost to three times during the season. Unfortunately, the team could not rise to the same level in the final against Tauranga Boys' College, losing it 3-0. Cameron Ragg and John Ward made the NZ Secondary Schools Tournament Team.

Beach Volleyball

The achievement of our volleyballers on the beach does merit a separate paragraph as it now runs under the guidance of Otumoetai College teacher and former/ current beach volleyballer, Charles Leota.

In 2005 the Junior National Secondary Schools beach title was won by Rachael Morgan and Hanna Croad with Jaimee Frew and Alex Edge winning the bronze medal. In the Senior final, Shannen Bagge and Simone Head beat Sarah McLean and Renee Handley.

In 2006, Rachael Morgan and Hannah Croad won the Bay of Plenty New Zealand Secondary Schools and the Australian U17 titles. Justine and Hayley Stovald were ranked 4th in New Zealand. Edwin O'Dea and Mike Watson, after playing the Pro-tour, won the National Secondary Schools Championship and then finished 17th at the World U19 Championship. Sam and Ben O'Dea won the Junior title.



2013 New Zealand Secondary Schools Beach Volleyball Championships Otumoetai College 2nd and 3rd placegetters 2007 saw Rachael and Hannah win the Senior girls Bay of Plenty title and retain their National title, and win the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Team of the Year. They also reached the semi-final of the New Zealand Pro-tour at Stanley Street and finished with a New Zealand Senior ranking of 4th. They went on to finish 9th at the World U19 Championships in Poland.

In 2008, Sam and Ben O'Dea won the Senior Secondary Schools National title with Logan King and Nathan Stewart 3rd. Sam O'Dea gained 9th place at the World U19 Championships. On the girls' side, Rachel Yardley and Samantha Charlton finished 3rd in the Bay of Plenty and 2nd at Nationals.

In 2009 at Nationals, 26 of the 98 teams were from Otumoetai. In the Junior boys, Andrew Bray and Griffin Muller won silver and Marek Church and Jack Thompson won bronze. Ben O'Dea and Reuben Gillard took silver in the Senior boys. In the Senior girls, Rachel and Sam were gold medal winners and national champions. Rachel has gone on to play libero for the National Women's team at the Asian Championships and Samantha is a current Blackstick, playing over 100 games for the New Zealand Women's Hockey team.

2010 saw Alyse Barclay and Aneta Buckley come 3rd at the Bay of Plenty Championships and 4th at Nationals held in Gisborne. Holly Boyle and Katie Wood won the Junior gold medal. James Gilling and Charlie Clague won bronze in the Junior boys.

2011 was the year of the bronze medal with Te Pae Thompson-Aporo and Abbie Meredith in the Junior girls and Holly and Katie in the Seniors. In the Senior boys, Grady Cameron and Jack Thompson won bronze and Andrew Bray and Griffin Muller won silver. Griffin also competed in the Swatch U19 Worlds in Croatia.

2012 saw Holly and Katie finally win gold in the Senior girls' event to become national champions. At the same tournament, James Gilling and Charlie Clague won silver in the Senior boys and Will Clague and Jack Boyle silver in the Junior boys. Liam Matheson competed at the World Youth championship in Cypress, finishing in 17th place.

Abbie Meredith and Claudia Richardson were 4th in the Seniors and Emily Farron and Kahla Tyson picked up a bronze in the Junior girls in 2013.

The 2013-2014 season started with the BOP championship. In the Senior Boys, Will Clague and Jack Boyle were 2nd and Jack May and Isaiah Duncan 3rd. In the Senior girls, Roebi Bidois and Emma Bain beat Emily Farron and Kahla Tyson in the final, with Melissa Christophers and Claudia Richardson 4th. In the Junior girls, Kahu Te Kani and McKenna Armstrong were 2nd.

At the North Island Junior Championships Lisa Miller and Abby Grainger both won the Year 9 gold medal and Grace Burnett and Brooke Bidois the Year 9 gold.

At the NZ Secondary Schools Championships, Brooke and Grace won the Junior silver medal. The Senior girls failed to fire but the Senior boys had two teams in the top eight, with Jack Boyle and Will Clague taking out the silver medal.

Underwater Hockey

This sport seems to have gone into abeyance after stellar performances in earlier years.

In 2005 the Junior girls finished 8th at Nationals with Letitia Jackson making the Tournament Team. In the Junior Open the college was 1st in the Northern region and 4th at Nationals, Jared Thompson making the Tournament Team. The Senior girls just failed to qualify and the Senior boys finished 7th at Nationals.

In 2006 the Nationals were held in Rotorua and the college won the Overall Top School Award for performing well in all four grades.

2007 saw the Junior boys winning the Northern Zone and taking out bronze at Nationals, with Mark von Harselaar and Anton Williams selected in the Tournament Team. The Senior boys, spearheaded by Simon Dowsett and Andrew Barlow, won silver. The Junior girls won gold, beating Tauranga Girls' College in the final 3-1, with Katrina Lynam and Candice Wilkinson playing outstandingly well.

In 2008 three players from the college, Letitia Jackson, Max Lynam and Andrew Barlow, were selected in the New Zealand U19 team to compete in the World championships in Durban. Katrina Lynam was the MVP this year for the Senior girls' team. The Junior girls won the bronze at the Northern Regionals in Auckland and finished 6th at Nationals with Meg Smart selected as MVP.

In 2009, Anton Williams and Caleb Kruger were selected in the New Zealand Tournament Team from Nationals. The Senior girls finished 6th with Leah Jonkman as MVP. The following year, Anton Williams (U18) and Nick Milne (U19) were selected in New Zealand teams.

Equestrian

This is a sport which has come to the fore in the last few years with the college doing very well at provincial level.

In 2007 the college who placed 4th in the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Show Jumping after being 2nd in the previous year. The team won the best overall school trophy with Rebecca Craw, Mary Mitchell and Krystal Grant all winning their respective classes.

2010 was Mary Mitchell's year, as she finished 2nd, 3rd and 6th in various events in the Open grade at Nationals and also 2nd in the Pony of the Year.

2011 again saw the team winning the Bay of Plenty Show Jumping Championships with Mary Mitchell to the fore.

2012 saw the team of Sophie Tingey, Anna Tingey, Finn Maloney and Mary Mitchell compete in the North Island Secondary Schools Show Hunter Championships and finish a very creditable 4th.

2013 saw the Equestrian team take out the Bay of Plenty Championships for the 3rd year in a row.

Unfortunately, in 2014 the BOP Show Jumping was cancelled. However, the team competed in the BOP Dressage with excellent results. The team were Paige Harris, Brooke Harris, Olivia Scott and Sophie Tingey.

Yachting / Sailing

The college (because of its location on Tauranga Harbour) continues to achieve on the water.

In 2005 the college lost the regional competition to Tauranga Boys' College so could not attend Nationals.

In 2009, Oscar Rorvik achieved the rare feat of taking out both the Turner and Tauranga Cups in the same year. Other sailors of note this year were Claudia Pierce, Sam Bullock and Phil Smith.

In 2010 the team comprising Sam Bullock, Liam Merton, Zak Merton, Oscar Rorvik, Phillip Smith and Graham Anderson finished 12th at Nationals. Sam Bullock won a silver medal at a world regatta in Turkey, with 18 nations

competing in the Open 29er skiff event. Both Oscar and Zak have also been selected to represent New Zealand.

In 2012, led by the dominator Phil Smith, the team of Liam and Zak Merton, Sam

Barnett, Sol Moore and Coral Headley gained promotion to the silver fleet and finished 4th. Zak Merton won the North Island Starling class and was placed 6th out of 140 sailors at Nationals, and won the Chris Timms Trophy for the highest placed U16 sailor.

2013 saw Zak Merton finish 5th at the International Sailing Federation Youth Worlds in Cypress and then 15th at the 420 Worlds in Valencia.

Coral Headley was the first girl at the National Windsurfing Championships. She also won the New Caledonian National Girls' title in November 2102. She was also 2nd in the Auckland Board Sailing Championships in the techno fleet, and the 1st girl.

Zac Merton continued his fine form from 2013 into the 2014 season. He competed in the Youth Worlds in Portugal and at the British Youth Championships in Weymouth, England. He also competed at the 420 Open Worlds in Germany, where he finished 11th overall out of a fleet of 111 boats.

Cycling

There are many forms of cycle competition and the college participation is governed by student and staff enthusiasm and interest. Courtney Lowe is probably our most famous exponent of the sport and she is now riding professionally in the USA.

In 2010, eleven riders competed at the Nationals in Levin. Top riders were Kirk Fisher, Dan Lawton and Matt Lawton.

2011 saw 19 students competing at Levin, of which eight were placed in the top ten. Kirk Fisher was 2nd in the U19's Downhill and Kieran de Grey also 2nd in the U16's Downhill.

2012 saw Kieran Ngatai 2nd in the U13's BMX Nationals in Rotorua.

In mountain biking, Zac Smith competed well but Matt Lawton achieved the school's best result with a 6th in the U15's Downhill.

Recent Sports

Two of the more recent sports that the college has supported teams in are Waka Ama and Motor Cross.

In 2012 our first Waka Ama team competed at Nationals and finished 2nd in the 500m boat event.

In 2013 the girls enjoyed a successful regatta at the Secondary Schools Nationals, finishing 11th in the 500m and 7th in the 250m. The coach was Gaylene McFarlane.

In 2012 the motor cross team finished 8th at an intercollege event in Huntly.

By 2013 the college team had 22 competitive riders.

The team placed 4th in the Bay of Plenty Motor Cross Competition School Trophy series with the outstanding riders being Tristan Tolley and Cameron McCaskie.

In 2014 Riley Biddle and Connor Brown came away with 2 golds in the K4 200m and K4 500m at the National Canoe Championships.

Also in 2014, Chakaya Taui was placed 2nd in the Senior girls' BOP Triathlon and Caitlin Hoskin 3rd in the Junior girls.

There are sports that come and go at college depending on the interest of staff and students. These are sometimes well-documented in Trek and sometimes not.

Canoe Polo

Canoe polo was a strong sport in 2005 with three teams (Junior boys, Senior girls and Senior boys qualifying for Senior School Nationals. The senior girls' team of Luuka Jones, Heather Peters, Jenna Stephens, Helen Curtis and Beth Harris won the bronze medal. These girls were all named in Tournament Teams and National U18 squads.

Richard Curtis was named in the NZ Junior Men's team for the third year.

In White Water Slalom NZ Secondary Schools Championships, Helen Curtis won the trophy for the top junior woman and Luuka Jones, who went on to become an Olympian, won the Women's Secondary Schools Combined Events Cup and Women's Nationals Combined Cup for DR and K1.

Kayaking

In 2012 Andre Sperling continued the college's fine tradition at the elite level of kayaking. He won the NZ U18 Freestyle Championship and the BOP and North Island U18 Freestyle Championship.

Sam Roy won silver in the NZ U18 K1 500 and was part of the NZ team to compete at the Junior and U23 World Championships.

In 2014 Anna Domett competed in the NZ and Oceania Marathon Kayaking Championship winning gold on Lake Karapiro.

Tennis

Tennis was strong at the college in 2005 with the mixed team qualifying for the main tournament in Wellington beating local rivals, Bethlehem College. The team of Laura Fisher, Rachel Yardley, Jess Arundel, Ben Twyman, Matthew Fisher and Simon Gyenge finished 7th.

In 2001 Sam Daly was 2nd in the BOP Secondary Schools Singles and Jeremy Burns and Scott Borren in the Senior boys and Harriet Callard and Mike Haguvara both won silver in the Division 1 Doubles.

In 2014 Millie Schuler and Tia Tarau won the Division 1 Junior Doubles and Damian Potts won 2nd in Division 1 Singles.

Dominic Daly and Dion Reed won the Senior Division 1 Doubles.

Surfing / Surf Life Saving

Surfing has been promoted by staff members Andrew Rapley and Hannah Sharps in recent years.

In 2005 Travis McCoy and Nathan Stewart were the main young surfers in the BOP Scholastic team.

In 2011 the college had an active surfing team of nine and Callum Chuter was selected to represent the BOP at the U14 Scholastic surfing event.

In 2011 Jessica Lacy, Emily Campbell and Katie Wilson won all medals at the NZ Surf Life Saving Championships.

In 2013 Katie Wilson was selected into the NZ U20 team to represent Surf Life Saving NZ at the 2013 International Surf Rescue Challenge in Japan.

In 2014 Jessica Gadsbey, Matthew Kriel and Alicia Wilson all gained podium finishes at the Surf Life Saving Nationals.

Skiing / Snowboarding

The college teams have been managed over the years by Debbie Clark and Patrick O'Reilly.

In 2005 the college was 3rd in the BOP with Karsten Hoetzel 1st in the Senior Men and 13th equal in the North Island (3rd public school and top BOP school out of 80 competing schools). Karsten was 4th in the Senior Men.

In 2006 Michael Ladyman was 2nd in the Senior BOP boys' event and Peter Brownless 3rd in the Junior boys.

Our major snowboarder has been Claudia Pierce who was 9th at North Island Championship.

Sports Outside College

The college likes to acknowledge its students who participate in sports outside the college sphere of influence, particularly if those students win provincial championships or reach national representation.

Rosie Collins competed at the Oceania Tae Kwon Do Championships in 2010 and took out the gold medal in the middle weight Blue Belt Sparring and Bonnie May Gibson won the bronze in the Blue Belt Junior Patterns.

In 2011 Eden Arkwright was a member of the NZ U18 Girls Development Water Polo team that won the bronze medal at the Hawaiian Invitational Tournament.

2011 also saw Mieka Watson coming 2nd in the BOP Secondary Schools Senior Rock Climbing competition and going on to 1st place in the U18 grade at the Nationals in Wanaka.

2014 saw Deborah Paine win the BOP Cross Country Championships and then come 14th at Nationals. She was not well on the day but was selected in the NZ team to compete in Australia and finished 11th, the first NZ runner home.

Chapter Eight



The Special Needs Unit 2007-2014

In 2007 to 2008 the Special Needs Unit saw a marked increase in the number of students coming to the unit for learning support. Programmes within the unit were updated and assistive technology became an integral part of the teaching and learning of special needs students. The unit also started to take on students with more severe behaviours in light of the changing face of disability and the implementation of the Special Education 2000 policies around schools demonstrating inclusive practices.

In 2009 it was clear that the old prefab buildings were not meeting the needs of students. In 2010 concerns from a strong group of unit parents and unit teachers advocated for a new unit to be built. This consensus was supported by Dave Randell, Bruce Farthing and the Ministry. Fortunately the request for a new building coincided with a nationwide review of Special Education that aimed to "ensure that students with special education needs participate in education and leave school equipped with the skills they need to fulfil their potential." (Review of Special Education 2010, p6.) The outcome, after much lobbying by Mr Randell for funds and donations from organisations like TECT, resulted in a brand new Special Needs unit being built. The unit was designed by Caly Pillay (HOD) and Rene Woest a senior teacher at the unit, in conjunction with Special Education Occupational Therapist Sarah McGregor and architects from Carling Architects Ltd. This collaboration provided a specialised unit with support rooms and purpose built classrooms. It was one of only a handful of purpose built units for secondary schools in the country.

From 2010 onwards numbers in the unit continued to grow until in 2014 there are currently 27 students, three full-time teachers, one part-time teacher and nine support staff. With a broader range of needs having to be met, new programmes, such as a senior life skills and social skills programme, have been developed by unit staff. In 2011 Unit teachers included in their programmes the teaching of NCEA Level 1 English and Mathematics over a two year period so that it was more achievable for special needs students. Over the last eight years programmes have continued to be revised based on student needs. The combination of highly experienced

Special Education staff, support staff and a purposebuilt facility have resulted in Otumoetai College's Special Needs Unit having an excellent reputation for its education of students with special needs in the wider community.

Student Leadership

Opportunities exist at all levels for students to develop and gain leadership skills. Year level councils, made up of students who volunteer, exist at Years 9 to 12. These are facilitated by the Deans at each year level and they meet every two weeks. Each year level has a particular Health Promotion Activity they promote and organise activities around. For example, for Year 9 it is Anzac Day and poppy selling, Year 10 Pink Shirt Day, Year 11 Conservation Week, Year 12 SADD month, and Year 13 Daffodil Day and Shave for a Cure. All year levels via their councils support Youth Week and Leadership Week.

Across the school students may volunteer their involvement and grow their leadership skills via Leo Club, Duke of Edinburgh Hillary Award, Spirit of Adventure voyages, Student Exchange programmes, Rypen Camp, Dale Carnegie course, Kapa Haka, Youth Horizons, MUNA, Year 12 Leadership Day, Year 13 Camp. For the majority of students, their skills are developed via their sporting and cultural participation.

Cross Age mentoring is something that has strengthened over the past few years of the decade. Peer Support mentoring of the new Year 9 students by Year 13 students is not new but it has morphed (about 150 Year 13 students are involved) so that it does not end after week 5 but continues for the first two terms of the year at extended form times. Student mentoring of the timid students at Year 9 and other students who may need some extra wrap around was started in 2014. Deputy Principal Ms Woodward coached some Year 12 and 13 students to mentor. The mentors meet at a set time every week with their mentees. They also meet with Ms Woodward regularly to get feedback. In addition to these groups, the school also has a successful Student Support programme. This is like a big brother/sister programme for students who may have issues with friends, concerns about school work, or just need to talk with another person. The training of students and the organisation of this is by the Guidance Department. It is a full year programme. Again students are coached and supported to do this.

In Year 13 the most obvious leadership positions are the four Head Students and the Student Representative to the Board of Trustees. Students, while in Year 12, are invited to put themselves forward for the Head Student positions. Mr Randell meets individually with them all. They are then short-listed with the help of the Year 12 Deputy Principal and Deans. The short-listed students speak in an assembly to all Year 9 to 12 students who then vote. Note is taken of the weighing of voting by the candidates' year level peers, the students who know them best. Staff are invited to offer comments on the nominees but the ultimate decision is made by the Principal. In September each year, anyone interested in being the student representative on the Board of Trustees self-nominates. The candidates all speak to the whole

school. This position is solely determined by student voting and the votes received are publicly displayed. These five positions are highly sought after.

The Student Executive is made up of the five student leaders and two people from each of the five committees: Sports, Creative Arts, Publicity, Special Occasion and Hauora (previously called Well-Being). Students are voted to the committees after the Year 13 camp early in the year. A teacher is involved in mentoring each of the committees. Agendas and minutes are kept at each of the fortnightly meetings which are fed back to the Executive meetings. Keeping records creates some cohesion between the committees each year and provides a template for future years. The Student Leaders who are all attached to a particular year level report back at each of the year level assemblies on matters that concern the whole school or the particular year level.

The significance of belonging to a year level has been emphasised by Dave Randell allocating each year level a colour, and a high point of being in year 13 is being photographed all in the "same" year colour. These photos for the last decade are placed on the wall of the entrance foyer.

A particular focus of all activities that happen in the school is to link them to the school vision and five values. Rather than do more the college has been aiming to focus on doing less, well.

The further refining of the structures and involvement of even larger numbers of students are issues that will continue to be the focus of management discussion and implementation into the future.

International Department

The International Department has been confirmed as very a strong entity – within the college throughout the decade. Appointed Director of International students in 2000, Roy Ballantyne remains in the same position in 2015.

In 2005 we began with a fully staffed Department and Joan Troy had taken over the Homestay Manager's role. This year saw the first of the now annual Parent Teacher Association (PTA) International Food Festivals, which the International Department has became fully involved with. The students became involved in the making and selling of the various national dishes that they produced. 2005 saw a decline in student numbers due to the collapse of the Chinese market. The year began with only 58 International students from diverse countries.

In the period 2006-2009, the student numbers grew rapidly and peaked at 105 in 2009. This growth was largely due to increased numbers from Germany and the development of the new Italian market. Both the International Department and the school were under pressure to cope with the influx of students. In addition to this, we also hosted four groups from Japan (2), Korea and Thailand. With these growing numbers, and a need to provide in-class support for our second language speakers, particularly with the growth of students from China, two Teacher Aides were employed to assist in classrooms. This was a most challenging time.

Added to the challenges were significant changes in the staffing. Shirley Martelli resigned as International Office Manager at the end of 2008. Joan Troy was her successor and the new Homestay Manager appointed, being Liz Anderson. Joanne Weston became the Office Assistant. This transitional period with staffing was seamless and ensured continuity. Joan Troy resigned at the end of 2014, being replaced by Joanne Weston who in turn has been replaced by Julie Torrey.

2010-2014 saw International student numbers decline on the back of a worldwide economic crisis and apparently bottom out in 2014. During this time, the numbers of students from Japan decreased markedly and does not look like recovering. However, the exciting development leading into 2015 is the significant growth in numbers of students from Korea. Despite the decline, the college sustained numbers better than most other secondary



schools. The over-all number never fell below 70. All credit must be given to the aggressive international marketing by Roy Ballantyne and Dave Randell. The Otumoetai College point of difference was the dual marketing team of Dave and Jude Randell who always travelled and marketed together, providing a level of comfort for both girls and boys, as well as mothers and fathers.

The School Ball

In the last decade the College Ball has become a high point in the senior school calendar. It has found its home in the Stadium Lounge at Baypark and there has been a series of spectacular themes used, from Palace Ballroom to Winter Wonderland to Shanghai Nights. Current music trends have been reflected in the absence of any traditional ballroom dancing. Live music also is now absent with DJ's providing the "sounds" for the students. The popularity of the ball means that over 500 people vie for tickets. The Special Occasions Committee of Year 13 students organise and manage the event.

Work Day

While the tradition of Work Day in March each year is strongly established in the area, it is becoming more difficult to implement. A roll of approximately 2000 students, a change in nationwide economic conditions, increasing health and safety regulations, a greater awareness of personal safety and less encouragement by families to support the event, are all factors contributing to this.

In saying this, the majority of students do serve the school and wider community with their efforts and contribute annually \$20,000 for student needs that cannot be funded from the operations grant. Over the last few years there have been water fountains built, a student BBQ constructed, shade cloths hung in the quad and canteen area, a new school van, and sound and lighting equipment for the Performing Arts Centre (PAC).

Students are supported to find work rather than expect their parents to pay. Community members are encouraged to phone in with requests and students are matched to these tasks, be they wood stacking, window cleaning, fence painting, or gardening. Those students unable to find work but wish to contribute, work around the school under the supervision of staff. Each year the grandstands are painted. Mr Furneaux has a band of helpers involved in weeding and landscaping the gully behind the school. For those students whose families ethically disagree with Work Day, modified lessons are provided for the day.

An added encouragement for participation is the \$50 class voucher for first class with all their money in and another for highest class average at junior and senior levels.

Te Whakatipuranga – School for Young Parents

Te Whakatipuranga – School for Young Parents – has continued to go from strength to strength over the last decade. Still managed by Robyn and Phil Merritt,

who have at various times over the decade moved the headship of the school between them and chosen between themselves to be either part-time or full-time. In 2014 Te Whakatipuranga has had up to 35 students on its roll, ranging in age from 14 years to 20 years. The school consists of two houses that have been joined together and are situated on the boundary of the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic. The building includes a computer area, a fashion and design area, a general classroom area, a baby-care area, a kitchen and a bathroom/toilet. Mothers with babies under six months bring them to class. Most then proceed to use the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic daycare, Kohanga Reo or their own families for the care of their children.

There is one full-time teacher, assisted by seven part-time teachers, two van drivers and a part-time social worker (2 mornings a week) who continues to be funded by the lottery grant. The school owns two vans that collect the students and babies and transport them to the school, if individual transport arrangements are not possible.

The students can study any secondary school subject up to NCEA Level 3 as well as a range of tertiary level subjects. Most subjects are taught in partnership with Te Kura (The Correspondence School). Some students are able to start papers at the Bay of Plenty Polytechnic or Waikato University and attend school as well to gain valuable support with their study. All students work towards National Certificates.

The school offers a wide range of co-curricular programmes and social support services including:

- Sport & Recreation activities
- Career Development & Work Experience
- Parenting programmes
 (Parents as First Teachers and Plunket)
- Budgeting courses
- Ante-natal classes
- Self -defence classes
- First Aid for Children
- Health Nurse
- Counselling

The school has always received very positive ERO reports, openly stating that it is one of New Zealand's top performing teen parent units. This, coupled with very clear government policy stating a strong commitment, means that a strong future is assured. Staff attend the two-yearly, teen parent school conference and in 2010 Te Whakatipuranga hosted the national conference at Bay of Plenty Polytechnic.

School Publications

Contact – the three-times a term newsletter, and TREK – the once a year college magazine, have remained in publication and central to disseminating and recording news of college events. The big addition, and now fully integrated into the life of the college, is the website. The website has fast become the community's first port of call for what people want to know about college

life. It contains all information and links to staff, publications, Contacts, TREKs, Prospectus and even a Portable Document Format (PDF) of 'Life Enlightened by Learning' Volume I. A much refined publication has been the annual Leavers' Magazine. A college Facebook page has been established and many ex-students have been made aware of the college 2015 reunion via the reunion Facebook page.

Emailing and texting parents has become part of everyday life from 2005-2014 and in 2013 the college progressed to booking report evenings online. This was welcomed by many parents.

As the subject of Media Studies has grown, school notices have been delivered by podcasts and film has captured student imagination and initiative over print media. Just as circulation of newspapers shrinks in society, school newspapers are now something of the past.

Advanced Learner Programmes and Supported Learner Programmes

The Supported Learner structures have been further refined from 2005-2014. In 2004 there were two Year 9 Homeroom classes and one Year 10 Homeroom class. Renamed Supported Learner classes, the number of classes has varied at each level in order the meet the need but has always remained at about 20. Throughout the period 2005-2014, HOD Jan Miles has strongly advocated for these students, ensured appropriate Teacher Aide support, and utilised the services of the Resource Teacher of Learning and Behaviour (RTLB) John Miles (her

husband). The students study English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and PE as a single entity but for 2015, Year 9 students will be placed with other students in an integrated PE programme. The SL students are placed across the option programme in line with all the other students. Jan chaired regular meetings of all staff who teach in the programme to ensure as consistent approach as possible to the students.

On his appointment in 2000, one of Principal Dave Randell's first decisions was to have an Advanced Learner programme. In 2007, Maddy Lambert was appointed Advanced Learner Coordinator and from that date onwards she more than adequately filled that role. Initially working with Mary Irvine, HOD Learning Centre, she refined the AL Camp (affectionately known as NERD camp), coordinated class placements at teacher meetings, mentored many students across a variety of activities, and assisted many staff with appropriately challenging teaching methodology.

Young Enterprise Scheme

The Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) is a national competition run by the Young Enterprise Trust its purpose is to inspire, educate and transform students through enterprising experiences. This long running programme is where students have the opportunity to form a business and market a product, while meeting financial and other reporting requirements that closely match those that pertain to regular businesses. Student companies are overseen and coached by teachers, in some cases across all curriculum areas, as well as having

generous access to the guidance of mentors from the local community.

Otumoetai College Young Enterprise teams have been formed by Year 12 and Year 13 students of Business and Accounting. Students soon realise that the dedication to be part of a successful company is enormous and it has been difficult at times to sustain the level of commitment needed over the year in face of other calls on time, in particular the senior academic workload.

Notwithstanding this, Otumoetai College has had a proud history of regular success in the national Young Enterprise competition, a competition entered by over 129 schools with more than 600 companies and 2700 students participating.

Regionally, Otumoetai College has won the Tauranga Chamber of Commerce Runner-up Award in 2007, 2009, 2010, 2012, 2013, and 2014. These companies include Serpent Enterprises (long board skateboards), Focus (charity wrist band), Kura NZ (NZ tourist guide explaining NZ culture), Tomoli Enterprises (tomato sauce and aioli combined condiment), Royala Enterprise (kiwifruit snack bar) and Meant to Bee (lemon honey Belgium chocolate).

Otumoetai College companies that have achieved national success include Vitalize in 2007 (aromatherapy Spritzers) and Tomoli in 2012 (tomato sauce and aioli combined condiment).

For all students that participate in the scheme, the business knowledge they develop is supplemented by skills in teamwork, communication, problem-solving, negotiation, and decision-making. Students also learn through experiencing the value of innovative thinking, and develop enterprising attributes.

A frequent comment made by former Young Enterprise students is that participation in the scheme remains one of the most valuable learning experiences they have ever had. Through it they have learned first-hand the practical skills of running a business, including recognising the pitfalls and obstacles to success, and learning to avoid or overcome them. It is also a memorable and fun experience that gives students the confidence to achieve their goals and demonstrate their true potential in their skill area, whether it be finance, marketing, production, managing or human resources.

For many Otumoetai College students, the YES experience has proven to be of advantage in their lives beyond school.

Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

Since 2005 the PTA has continued to make a valuable contribution to the College through the dedicated efforts of a group of enthusiastic and committed parents.

The 'Book-a-rama' has continued to be a regular event at the Baycourt venue. Since 2005 this method of fundraising has become increasingly popular in Tauranga, and despite the increased competition, the College event has remained a firm favourite for many residents. This has been reflected in consistently worthwhile returns from the event.

In 2005 A new initiative involving the PTA resulted in the College's first international food festival. This was seen as a way of bringing the community into the college as well as utilising the talents of the wide range of international students at Otumoetai. Since its inception the food festival has become an eagerly anticipated annual community event. Held towards the end of March, the festival features cuisine from Asia, Europe, North and South America and South Africa and attracts crowds of up to 3,000 people. Students have also often added to the international flavour of the evening by wearing national costumes.

In 2013 the PTA added further to its range of fund initiatives with the holding of a successful quiz evening. An entertaining evening saw the Performing Arts Centre packed out, with the event enjoying strong support from both the community and college staff. Plans are already being put in place for another quiz evening in 2015.

These events have raised many thousands of dollars for the benefit of students and staff at the college. At the start of 2014 the PTA contributed \$25,000 towards the purchase of a new college minivan. Assistance has also been given with the purchase of sports equipment, funding of overseas trips, assistance for families under financial pressure, and provision of funding for staff scholarships.

In addition to these major fund activities, many hours have been given in providing cups of tea and coffee at report evenings, prize-givings and orientation evenings. The PTA has also helped out with providing personnel to help run the uniform shop, a service appreciated by many parents.

The college has indeed been fortunate to benefit from the dedicated enthusiasm and sheer hard work provided by members of the PTA over the last ten years. During the last decade an outstanding job has been done in maintaining and building on the tradition of assistance established in the first 40 years of the college.

Additional Activities

To conclude the 'Traditions and Special Features' chapter there are even more activities that become central to the lives of some staff and students. For those involved, these activities are looked forward to each year but there can be a variety of commitment from year to year. These include, but are not limited to Duke of Edinburgh, Spirit of Adventure, Outward Bound and Outdoor Pursuits, Project K, Young Innovators, Underground Christian group, 40-hour Famine, Market Day, Model United Nations and Prize-givings. As the college moves forward, the traditions and special features will continue to be modified and changed over time.



He akonga te oranga Learning enlightens life

Since its opening in February 2002 Okohanga, the school whare wananga and marae complex, has been a wonderful resource and asset to the college. Year 9 students are welcomed to Ōtūmoetai College with a powhiri by the kapa haka, their Year 13 buddies, kaumātua and staff on the first day of each new school year. Mr Randell will explain that the tekoteko on top of the whare does not hold a taiaha or weapon of war, but rather a scroll to represent learning and that the three kete on the poutāhu, the front centre pole, are the three baskets of knowledge. Mananui, the school marae, and Okohanga, named after the food gardens that were on the land in former times, are truly a rich and valued part of the school life. During the year many powhiri are performed to welcome new students or visitors to the college.

Kapa haka continues to be living and vibrant. Te Rōpu Kapa Haka, also called Ngā Piki Kōtuku a Ranginui. This group has been operating in the college for the last 33 years. It has entered many cultural festivals that require considerable amounts of time, practice and learning. The group has continued to enter the Manu Ariki competitions and 2007 was a high point when the group performed with distinction, coming home with a number of trophies. Students also gain Service Awards and Blues Awards within the school.

Each year Māori language students and students of Māori descent are encouraged to enter the Ngā Manu Körero speech competitions. Speakers are then chosen to represent the college. Formerly known as the Korimako Speeches, this competition incorporates four sections: Junior English or the Sir Turi Carroll speeches; Senior English, the Korimako speeches named after the bellbird which heralds the dawn; Junior Māori, also called the Rāwhiti Ihaka section and the Senior Māori section named after Doctor Pei Te Hurinui Jones. Speakers representing their schools compete in the Mātaatua regional competition and winners only will go on to participate at the National Competition. To speak at the Regional Ngā Manu Kōrero speeches continues to be a huge responsibility as well as a big honour for those students who take up the challenge. Our students have shown themselves to be excellent participants and have spoken at regional competitions with passion and pride.

November 2013 saw the end of an era at Ōtūmoetai College with the retirement of Hiriwā Irene Curnow after 33 years of service to the college, students, whānau and the wider school community. Hiriwā established a tradition of excellence and high expectations and she has left a lasting legacy at the by way of the school marae. Her knowledge of te reo me ōna tikanga was

immeasurable and she brought a wealth of knowledge that extended back to her ancestors. "Tūhoe moumou kai, moumou taonga, moumou tāngata ki te pō." The Tūhoe tribe are renowned for their generosity with food, vast resources and ferocity in battle. Hiriwā embodies the strength and resourcefulness of her people and she brought that tenacity and fighting spirit with her into the classroom. "Ahakoa iti, he pounamu." Although small in size, she is huge in spirit and her teachings have impacted on generations of rangatahi and by the hapū and iwi of Tauranga Moana.

The past ten years have seen two major initiatives for our Māori students. The first was an idea instigated by Matua Ihaka Griffin-Matthews and in February 2007 a group of Year 10 Māori students became the first "whānau" type class. The aims of the class were retention of students to the end of Year 13, combined with high expectations of participation and personal goals. The programme was given the name "Te Poutama o te Mātauranga", meaning the stairway to academic achievement and learning. The programme has been slightly modified over the years as the students are no longer taught as a core group; however the supportive, whānau concept of the form class remains. 2014 saw the eighth group of Poutama students reach Year 13.

The second initiative followed a visit by the school kaumatua, Ray Nelson, along his wife Raiha, and the then Deputy Principal, Mihi Moloney to Kaipara College to hear of the success of their Māori awards evening. The idea was taken up by the staff and the first Ōtūmoetai Māori Celebration Evening was held at the end of 2007. Māori students who graduated from Year 13 were presented with wooden waka designed by Kevin Meyer, the Head of the Technology Department. The evening has now become an annual event along with the other two special awards evenings, Creative Arts and Sports Awards, at the end of the school year. 2014 saw special certificates on a three tier system, Tū Kaha, Tū Māia and Tū Rangatira, being presented for the first time. Students are nominated by their subject teachers for effort (kaha), achieving goals (pūkenga) and kotahitanga (contribution and interpersonal skills). Form teachers nominate for awhi, manaakitanga and whanaungatanga – being supportive, welcoming and working as a team. In this way the values of the "Ōtūmoetai Way" are being acknowledged through belonging and connecting, relationships, high expectations, lifelong learning and service to Te Ao Māori, the Māori community.

Community relationships continue to be developed and strengthened. He Ara Tika, is a mentoring programme led by senior Māori students working alongside junior

students. He Matahauāriki has been instrumental in supporting this programme, along with Matua John Miles. At this point we need to mihi to Ray and Raiha for their 14 years of service to the college. Ray stepped down from his role as kaumatua to the school and the Board of Trustees in November 2014. "He kokonga whare e kitea, he kokonga whare e kore e kitea." The corners of the house can be seen but the corners of the heart cannot. Our gratitude is immense.

The college has maintained strong working relationships with local iwi through other community links such as Ngāitamarāwaho and iwi education plans; Pip Woodward, one of the current Deputy Principals, and Dave Randell have attended a number of meetings to kōrero about education plans and community aspirations for the future. In 2014 the college signed up with the Ministry of Education to become part of the Kia Eke Panuku – a programme designed to change teaching methods to raise Maori achievement.

The college staff have also been involved in professional learning such as a visit to Hūria marae. They have been privileged to be taken on guided bus tours, trips to Matakana and they have had guest speakers to take them to places of local history such as the Ōtūmoetai Pā site or the battle of Pukehinahina, Gate Pā.

The Principal, Dave Randell, has a direct line to Mōrehu Ngātoko and over the years we have been supported by kaumātua such as Pere Kohu, Tūmatawha Pearson, kuia such as Merewhiua Bennett, Maora Reed, Mabel Wharekawa Burt and the Māori Women's Welfare League, to name just a few. The school continues to have a Māori parent representative on the Board of Trustees as

well as calling on local kaumātua, kuia and whānau to be actively involved in the life of the college. The college values its links with the local hapū Ngāitamarāwaho, Ngāti Hangarau, Ngāti Matepū, and iwi, Ngāiterangi, Ngāti Ranginui and Ngāti Pūkenga.

In 2010 the staff farewelled Darryn Marshall who left to travel to a new life in New York. He left behind a legacy of whakairo (carvings) in Okohanga and a large number of artworks around the college, from the reception area to the International Department to a large multimedia interpretation of Tauranga Moana up in the staffroom.

The school marae is used by not only Māori classes for teaching and learning, for noho marae, for kapa haka practice, but it is also used by Maths students for measurement, art students for drawing and sketching, special needs students for waiata and English students for writing narratives, as well as for many other purposes during the school year. Each year the Year 9 Social Studies classes visit Okohanga for a special study on marae tikanga. In 2013 the new wharepaku, ablution block, was opened and a new waharoa, entrance way, was added later in the year. Extra outside seating has also been added for the comfort of large groups during pōwhiri.

The teaching of te reo extends from year nine through to bursary and scholarship level at year thirteen and is now broken into two strands: Te Reo Māori NCEA achievement standards and/or unit standards and Te Reo Rangatira for more fluent students from immersion or kura reo programmes. Māori Performing Arts NCEA credits are also available for students who demonstrate commitment and performance skills in kapa haka.

As the College moves into the latter half of its first century, the third generation of some families already have an association with it. This is evidence of the college being an integral part of life in the wider area of Otumoetai. The college has come to have a sense of permanence, an identity, about which residents hold their own perception.

Throughout the past 50 years the college has operated within the New Zealand social, political and economic context. This context has witnessed shifting political and economic policies, all generated because their authors believed them to be the right way forward but all of which have generated work for management for sometimes seemingly little benefit. One can recall the endless meetings that heralded the advent of "Tomorrow's Schools" in 1989. The social and economic context of the college zone has always witnessed a very wide economic disparity and very different attitudes to the value of education. The last decade has seen the gap grow even wider. In November 2014 the

> government lowered the decile rating (scale 1-10) of the college from an 8 to a 7, which will bring with it the advantage of \$50,000 funding. This funding will be targeted to help raise the low attainment levels of less advantaged students. The staff cannot control the societal context in which the college operates and those who have enjoyed long careers have had to adapt teaching methods to meaningfully connect with, and advance, the learning of today's teenagers. The decades to come will see the development of more open and flexible learning environments, the increased use of technology and a real focus on raising Maori achievement. Despite all the many views, Boards, Principals, Deputy Principals and Staff have given of their best for the good of others. The college can look back with a sense of pride on the past fifty years and from it take strength to face an always uncertain future.
